**Pumping the Dairymen.**

RAYMOND, WASH., Sept. 2.—Some 20 or more dairymen of Menlo, are wondering what has become of P. McIntosh who operated the Menlo cheese factory, and who has disappeared leaving behind some \$12,000 in checks given in payment for milk received at Menlo and other places where he operated cheese factories. The checks were returned by a Woodland, Wash. bank, protested.

The Menlo dairymen are losers some \$7000 or more and their work during the past two months has gone for nothing. There is something like \$1000 worth of cheese on hand, and perhaps another \$1000 worth, which was shipped last week, and on which they hope to stop payment.
