There were only three changes made in the assessment of timber, one being on a logged off timber claim belonging to the Wheeler Lumber Co., the valuation of lots at Pacific Harbor were reduced from \$15 to \$10, and one block at Ocean Lake was reduced from \$600 to \$510.
