He was married less than two years ago to Miss Anna Gulstrom, of this county. He was confined in the hospital for several months, his wife being with him at the last. He leaves an infant daughter. His bereaved wife and relatives have the sympathy of the community.

These parties were married in Tillamook June 25th, 1906, and one child was born to the union. Plaintiff alleges in her complaint that the defendant wanted her to live an immoral life at the beach resorts in Tillamook and from the proceeds of which they would be able to live together in Portland the coming winter, which Mrs. Rice refused to do, and the conduct of the plaintiff becoming so unbearable she left him.
