It has been decided to hold the Butter and Cheese Maker's Convention and the State Dairymen's Association meetings in Tillamook the latter part of this month. The exact date will be announced next week.

The City Council passed an ordinance regarding stock being driven through the city, and any person who does so and allows cattle to run on lawns will be prosecuted. The ordinance compels those who take cattle through the city to have them properly guarded.

County Judge Mason bought a thoroughbred Jersey heifer at the State Fair, which took second prize. It is two years old and on Tuesday it gave birth to a heifer calf. He had an agreement with the person he bought the heifer from that if the calf was a bull, he would pay \$150 for it. He values the calf at \$200.

Jack Latimer met with a bad accident last Thursday. While riding a motorcycle, he collided with Eugene Jenkins' auto. As a result, Jack has several broken ribs and will be laid up for awhile. He intends staying in Tillamook this Fall, however, not taking up his studies at the dental college at Portland until later.

Within the next month several of our business men will move into the new Oddfellow's and Masonic buildings. The First National Bank, A. J. Stillwell and the City Transfer Co. will occupy the ground floor of the Oddfellow's building, and Dr. Jack Olsen, Dr. R. T. Boals, F. S. Whitehouse, Attorney S. S. Johnson and Dr. Went will occupy the offices.

The P. R. & N. Ry. has installed a new style crossing sign at the county road crossing near the Kilchis river bridge. In addition to the standard sign at the crossing, which has been added a large red disk, a distant danger post has been installed on the county road as an additional warning to teams and automobiles that they are approaching a railroad crossing. The P. R. & N. are trying this style of sign as an experiment to see if it is more efficient than the plain crossing sign.

School District No. 35 vs. School Districts Nos. 31 and 9, the District Boundary Board et al was a suit filed in the circuit court, which calls into question the matter of School District No. 9 taking territory which belonged to School Districts Nos. 31 and 35. The contention of the plaintiff is that the acts of the District Boundary Board were unconstitutional and void and asks that the court issue a mandatory injunction to the county clerk requiring him to extend upon the tax roll the school tax of 1.8 mills on the dollar in School District No. 35.

The Kil Kare Klub held their September meeting at the home of Mrs. Harter. The year's study of the subject of Japan was outlined. Mrs. Mason read an original and interesting paper, which was followed by the usual club reading. The guests of the afternoon were: Mrs. Lamb, Mrs. Burge, Mrs. Poorman and Mrs. Vint. There was a full membership present and an enjoyable reunion spirit pervaded the meeting. Dainty refreshments were served by the hostess, following which the club adjourned to meet in two weeks with Mrs. Alderman.

The sixth prize won last week by Tillamook at the State Fair in the county exhibits was \$100. Some surprise was caused at the small amount of the prize for the best display of cheese which was won by the Tillamook County Creamery Association, as it only amounted to \$5.00. This was, no doubt, on account of little or no display of cheese at previous fairs. In the cheese scoring contest Tillamook took all the prize, which were as follows: Gordon Burge, score 95, \$23.00; Andrew Christensen, score 94, \$8.00; A. J. Schmelzer, score 94, \$8.00; C. Nelson, score 93, \$6.00; Albert Schlappi, score 93, \$6.00; N. V. Kerby, score 93, \$6.00; Harry Thomas, score 91, \$2.00; Oscar Werschkul, score 91, \$2.00; Hugh Barber, score 91, \$2.00; Howard Bunn, score 91, \$2.00; F. Mitzsky, score 88.

Appeals in The Hadley Case.

Two appeals have been filed in the Otelia Hadley vs. C. E. Hadley case, which was tried before Judge Cambell and decided in favor of C. E. Hadley.

Attorney Oak Nolan appeals from the judgment of the Circuit Court, and Attorney R. R. Duniway also appeals the case on the ground that the court erred in dismissing the suit and denied the defendant a decree for costs and disbursements against the plaintiff, and it is to recover this that the suit is appealed.

Glensslin Sold for \$550.
British Consul Erskine conducted a court of inquiry at 10 o'clock yesterday in Portland into the loss of the British ship Glensslin, which is hard and fast on the rocks at the base of Necarney Mountain, near Nehalem.

The wreck was sold Tuesday for \$530 to John Caarimen and A. Bremmer, who expect to salvage considerable property. It is said stores alone that remain on board are valued at from \$1100 to \$1200 and there is a mass of tackle, deck gear and like equipment that can be removed if weather conditions do not prove troublesome. The southerly blow of Monday did no material damage, and unless it blows strongly from the southwest, shipping men say, a barge might be gotten near the wreck and salvage operations successfully carried on.

FIRE DESTROYS LAUNDRY.

Loss Amounts to \$6,500, With \$1,000 Insurance.

Soon after five o'clock on Wednesday morning the Crystal Steam Laundry in this city was totally destroyed by fire, the loss amounting to \$6,500, with \$1,000 insurance. The fire was first discovered by Mrs. Julius Erickson, who lives near and she raised an alarm. By the time the fire appliance arrived the fire had made considerable headway, and when a gasoline tank exploded ignited the whole of the interior of the building, which made a fierce fire. The only thing that the fire company could do was to confine the fire to the building, which they succeeded in doing. The only thing that is of any value left is the boiler, which is not damaged. The laundry belonged to E. N. Wagy and H. E. Bailey, and had considerable laundry work on hand. The insurance was in the building.

CIRCUIT COURT.

Grand Jury Returns Several Indictments.

The October term of the circuit court convened on Monday with Judge Webster Holmes on the bench.

All the juries having answered to their names, the judge excused L. M. Kramer and H. L. Provoost on account of sickness in the family and business, the former being postmaster of Cloverdale.

The grand jury was drawn composed of J. M. Bodle, J. H. Johnson, Chas. Kunze, G. H. Ward, M. Abbanalp and Lewis L. Johnson. After making his charge to the jury the judge appointed Mr. Kunze foreman.

In the cases of E. Hummel and Vernon Loomis the grand jury returned "no bills."

Orley Kellow is charged with the crime of assault with a dangerous weapon upon A. A. Imloh. Kellow pleaded not guilty and will be tried either this afternoon or Friday.

Bert Zavitz, charged with the crime of larceny of \$35 from W. F. Balmer. Defendant pleaded guilty to simple larceny and the court fixed Friday for passing sentence.

J. Erickson is Taxed \$200.
Two indictments were returned against Julius Erickson, who was charged with assault and battery upon his wife, Ethelina Erickson, on two separate occasions. Erickson pleaded guilty to one complaint and stood trial on the other. In the first case Erickson was fined \$200.00 and costs, and in the second case the jury, after several hours deliberation, brought in a verdict of not guilty. Erickson paid the fine.

Grand Jury's Report.
The grand jury was excused on Tuesday after presenting the following report:

"We the undersigned duly empaneled grand jurors for the October term of the Circuit Court for 1913 for Tillamook County, beg leave to report to your honorable court that in our judgment satisfactory conditions exist as to the county jail and county court house building."

Chase Settles Case for \$250.
George E. Leach, plaintiff, vs. W. O. Chase, defendant. Damages. As per stipulation in open court plaintiff was given judgment for \$250 and costs and disbursements of the action.

This was a case where George E. Leach, deputy game and fish warden, sued W. O. Chase for \$15,000 damages, growing out of a slanderous speech the defendant made in Portland. It was alleged
