TILLAMOOK COUNTY, OREGON. Land of Ready Money, Dairy Herds, Cheese, Fish and Dahlias.

The United Artisans have invaded Tillamook County and the invaders found it to be a place where people grow rich making cheese and happy growing dahlias. It is a land skirted on one side by wonderful forests and on the other by beautiful beaches of white sand—the boundary of the Pacific ocean, where one may listen to the diaphanous of the waves as they play upon the keyboard of the shores. Owners of dairy herds flash checks of \$500 or more in your face, the proceeds from the milk of 40 cows for one month. They kick up the black loamy soil while talking of its fertility. They point to the long stretches of meadow land where grass is green all the year round. They talk of lumber by millions of feet. They dump boat loads of salmon upon the wharves. They take you to see a score or more of cheese factories where Tillamook full cream cheese is made. They take you over many miles of macadamized roads; show you concrete bridges, low grades and expensive road machinery. You cross many beautiful streams—Nehalem, Trask, Wilson and Tillamook rivers. You pass through growing towns, and enthused as you are, you want to sell out the old home and move to the new land. Home After Twenty-Six Years Absence.

J. A. Dawson of Tillamook City, Ore., is here for a visit with his brothers, Charley, Shade, Sam and John Dawson and his sisters, Mrs. Mary Reese and Mrs. Betty Holt. The chief industry in Tillamook county is dairying and the receipts received by farmers from dairy products last year amounted to more than six hundred thousand dollars. Mr. Dawson says little farming is done in his county, but much farming is done in adjoining counties. He notices much improvement in Newport and Coche county. He was agreeably surprised at the beautiful homes in the town and on every road out. Another noticeable change is the improvements on the big farms.

In his youth Mr. Dawson was noted for his fun making and as he grows older still maintains that it is good for a man to laugh. When he arrived a few mornings ago on passenger train No. 30, which reaches Newport about four o'clock he went into collusion with a number of fellows around the depot to play a practical joke on Sheriff Dawson. BOND ELECTION ORDERED.

Clatsop County Will Vote on Issue of \$400,000 for Road Improvements.

ASTORIA, Ore., Oct. 3.—Clatsop County will hold a special election on Tuesday, November 4, to vote on the issue of \$400,000 in 20-year, 6 per cent bonds to raise money for public highway improvements.

The County Court made a formal order today calling for the election, in response to petitions signed by over 208 registered voters. It is understood that should the bonds be voted, approximately \$200,000 will be expended on the construction of a main highway between here and Westport, \$100,000 on the improvement of the road from this city via the Nehalem Valley to the county line near Vesper and the other \$100,000 will be spent on the thoroughfare from Seaside to Tillamook County line.
