Urie to use the waters of Trask river at a point in section 30, township 1, south range 8 west, for power purposes and to supply the people of Tillamook City and contiguous territory with electric light and power, also a franchise for the use of public roads, highways and streets for poles, etc. It is stipulated that work must commence within one year and be completed in 18 months. The franchise is for 30 years.

Smith, is a suit filed in the circuit court in which plaintiffs pray the court of equity will assume jurisdiction of the suit and upon the final hearing thereof will enforce a forfeiture and cancellation of the lease and oust the defendant therefrom and restore the same to plaintiffs, and remove the cloud upon the title of plaintiff's property by reason of said lease, and grant plaintiffs such further, other and different relief as a court of equity seems meet and proper in the premises.
