FINE BALANCING FEAT.

The Dancing Glass on the Knives on the Bottles. Take two bottles of the same height. Insert in each a cork, the top of which has been cut into wedge or gable shape.

This will require a little adjusting of the distance between the bottles or of the quantity of water in the glass, but after a few attempts you will find that the weight of the glass just balances that of the knife blades.

By drawing a few drops of water from the glass this will raise a little with the knife blades. If now you take a thread with a metal button or a small piece of lead tied to it and lower this into the water the glass and the knife blades will descend. They rise again as you withdraw the weight.
