Mr. Snelling, though thinking a great deal of Old Yamhill, thinks that it is a disgrace for a county like that to have such horrible roads.

**Tuesday's Election.**

The election on Tuesday, to vote on five measures passed by the State legislature, but referred to the people on referendum petitions, resulted in four being voted favorably upon and one rejected. There were a number of "wet" and "dry" elections, which resulted in eleven cities being added to the "dry" column and three "dry" towns going "wet."

Clatsop County voted for a bond issue of \$400,000, \$100,000 of which will be used to construct a road from Astoria to Seaside and thence to the Tillamook county line.

"Wet" towns that go "dry"—Salem, Oregon City, Springfield, Hillsboro, Woodburn, Dufur, Rainier, Stayton, Sherwood, Gresham, Harrisburg and precincts 57, 58, 59, 60 and 61 in Portland.

"Dry" towns that go "wet"—Loring, Sweet Home, Waldport.

"Dry" towns that stay "dry"—Wallowa, Florence.

"Wet" towns that stay "wet"—The Dalles, Joseph, Milwaukie, Southernlin, Bandon, Newport, Falls City, Wasco, Haines, Metolus, Eagle Point and precinct 76 in Portland.

The measures which carried were: State University Building Repair Fund.

State University New Building Appropriation.

County Attorney Act.

Workmen's Compensation Act.

The measure which failed to carry was the Sterilization Act.

There was a small vote in Tillamook county, the two largest precincts, Tillamook and Hoquarton, with about 1000 voters, casting only 192 votes. Tillamook county vote:

State University Building Repair Fund—Yes, 294; No, 317.

State University New Building Appropriation—Yes, 274; No, 336.

County Attorney Act—Yes, 304; No, 286.

Sterilization Act—Yes, 244; No, 353.

Workmen's Compensation Act—Yes, 438; No, 160.

**Fair Association Dissolved.**

A meeting of the Tillamook County Fair Association was held Saturday at the Tillamook Commercial Club, for the purpose of considering the advisability of dissolving the Association. To be able to handle what money the State appropriates for a county fair, the Association should have been organized the 1st June, but as it had not done so by that date it could not act legally. Therefore, under the circumstances, it was thought best to dissolve and allow the County Fair Board to manage future fairs. This was agreed to. The following resolutions were adopted:

"Whereas, we as a Fair Association, have demonstrated that a County Fair can be successfully carried on, also considering our success at the State Fair with such limited opportunities, we recommend a better annual county fair; a better annual county exhibit to be sent to the State Fair. We further recommend that a permanent county exhibit be established in Tillamook City and that preparations be made for an exhibit at the Panama Exhibition in 1915; and further that a county expert be secured who will work under the direction of the State Agricultural College and United States Department of Agriculture. We believe that if these recommendations be carried out, it will result in a limited good to Tillamook County."

**Circuit Court.**

Judge Wm. Galloway held an adjourned term of the circuit court on Friday, when the following cases were disposed of:

A. B. Saling vs. Charles Chaffee, Plaintiff having been directed by the court to deposit \$7.50 to the order of the defendant, and having failed to do so, the court ordered a non-suit.

James Hughey and Wesley Rush, administrator of the estate of Myra Hughey, deceased, vs. Hiram W. Smith. Case dismissed on joint petitions of plaintiffs and defendant.

Rudolph Zachman vs. James Vernon and wife and C. E. Hadley. Judgment in favor of plaintiff.

All jurors were excused with the exception of D. Fitzpatrick, M. R. Hanenkraft, M. E. Gruber, Frank Tone, P. J. Brown, J. W. Maddux, Chas. Goeres and D. A. Simmons.
