### SERIOUS SHOOTING CASE

#### Oral Thayer Discharge Revolver Pointed at Leo Doerge.

A serious shooting accident happened in this city on Wednesday, which may prove fatal to Leo Doerge, a boy 14 years of age, and the son of Ed Doerge, the contractor. It appears that the boy and Oral Thayer, 16 years of age, and a son of Grant Thayer, had an old 32 caliber revolver and were playing "hold up." It seems that they filled the revolver with shells and Doerge fired a shot in the air, but instead of doing so it passed over the head of a man on the side walk, who cautioned the boys to be more careful. Both boys ran around the house and entered the toilet, where Thayer took the revolver. According to Doerge's statement he told Thayer not to point the revolver at him, and asked him to remove the shells. Thayer told Doerge he would show him how they did it in the moving pictures, and getting down on his knees pointed the revolver at Doerge, discharging the weapon. Thayer was under the impression that the cartridges had been taken from the revolver, for he claims that Doerge had snapped it several times. When Thayer took the weapon it was cocked. The contents entered Doerge's stomach passing through the stomach three times and lodged in the back. The injured lad was taken at once to Dr. Boals' hospital, who did everything possible to save the boy's life. He remains in a precarious condition.
