THE COUNTY LEVY IS 24 MILLS.

County Court Reduced the Budget \$109,830 76.

The County Court, after wrestling with the budget for next year's expenditures for several weeks, came to a final decision on Thursday, the result of which the budget now carries an expenditure of \$357,397.12. This is a reduction of \$109,830.06 in the first budget, and about \$13,000 lower than that agreed upon at the taxpayers' meeting on Friday. This means a saving of \$79,898.09 to the timber owners, who pay 75 per cent of the taxes, and \$29,932.60 for all other classes of taxpayers, which makes the county tax, outside of State tax, 2½ mills lower.

Considering everything, the new budget should satisfy everybody, but there are those who still hold that the Court should have stuck to the improvements it contemplated, and those who would have reduced the budget more than the Court did. There is one thing, however, about the budget that is to be regretted, and that is reducing the money for road work, which will have the effect of delaying some road work that is necessary. Considering that the county has 600 miles of roads to maintain, each road district should have \$5,000. This is none too much if this county expects to keep pace with other counties.

The County Court in making the levy fully considered and recognized the urgent need of altering and enlarging the Court House. The growth of the county and increase in volume of business of the several offices of county administration, plainly indicate the necessity of enlarging the Court House, and a great number of our taxpayers who know the conditions were satisfied that the proposed improvement is absolutely necessary and that it is only a question of a very short time when the enlargement of the Court House could be no longer postponed.

The matter of purchasing a poor farm and conducting the same for demonstration purposes and operating the farm on a paying basis was not as important an item as the enlargement of the Court House yet it has many splendid features and would be of great benefit to the county at large and would no doubt be a splendid investment. The

increase of \$52,886 to be paid to the state is about 3½ mills additional tax compared with last year.
