

**PENSION LAW IGNORED.**

**Marion County Court Does Not Provide for Widows.**

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 16.—“We have not put the widows' pension law into operation in this county and do not intend to do so unless compelled by the courts,” said County Judge Bushey, of Marion County, to day.

“We do not believe the results under the new law would be as satisfactory as under the old one through which we are taking care of the poor of the county. One reason for the court's opposition to the law is that it makes unfair distinctions between women who have children and those without them. Another reason is that the plan for giving aid provided in the act would, in our opinion, cause many women and children who could do something for themselves, virtually to become helpless in that line.

“For instance, under the old poor law recently provided for a half dozen poor families; took care of their immediate wants, and soon members of them found employment and became self-sustaining. Under the widows' pension law, the families would have become pensioners with no incentive to do anything for themselves.

“I believe at least 500 persons have made application for assistance under the new act. Our investigations proved that some of them had money and others had farms. It is true the farms in most instances were mismanaged and yielded nothing, but it is not the duty of the county to take care of persons who have property.”

**The Pendleton Round Up.**

PENDLETON, Ore., Jan. 17.—Dates for the 1914 Round-Up were definitely selected as September 24, 25 and 26 by the board of directors here to-day. This early action was taken at the urgent request of the eastern railroads who have agreed to put the Round-Up on as an additional drawing card for their regular fall home-seekers' excursion in order that they might have plenty of time to get their literature printed and distributed over the country and get it into the hands of the prospective home-seekers. As the Round-Up, especially, during the past two years, has drawn heavily from the east and middle west, the railroads have taken advantage of this and are combining with their regular colonist rates, after trying out nearly every week in September during the past four years the management has become firmly convinced that the last week of the month is the best time for staging the Round-Up and have lected it permanently.

**The Income Tax.**

Portland, Ore., Jan. 2, 1914.  
County Treasurer, Tillamook County, Oregon.

DEAR SIR,—Enclosed I am sending you a few blanks relative to income tax. Please give the matter as such publicity as you wish, through the press and otherwise, that any person, firm or corporation desiring income tax blanks procure the same by applying his office.

This law as to failing to make return is as follows:

This return must be filed on or before the last day of March succeeding the close of the calendar year for which return is made.

The penalty for failure to file return within the time specified is \$50 to \$1000. In case of wilful neglect to render the return within the required time (except in case of sickness or absence) or that shall be added to the amount of tax assessed. In case of fraudulent return, 100 per cent shall be added to such tax.

Any person required by law to render, sign or verify any return who makes any false or fraudulent return or statement with intent to defeat or evade the assessment, required by this section to be made, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be fined not exceeding \$500, or be imprisoned not longer one year, or both, at the discretion of the court, with the effect of prosecution.”

**Water Permits Granted.**

During the quarter ending December 31, 1913, the State Engineer issued 38 permits for the irrigation of 6,933 acres and the development of 1,958 horsepower. Among these permits was one issued to F. D. Small of Tillamook, and D. C. Urie of Camas, Washington, for the development of 1,209 horsepower with the waters of Trask River in Tillamook County.

For the year 1913, a total of 466 permits were issued for the appropriation of water. Under these permits 342,181 acres will be irrigated, 39,225 horsepower developed and 41 reservoirs constructed at a total cost of \$44,000,000.

Permits issued in Tillamook County for the past quarter are as follows:

The Title & Trust Company of Portland secured a permit to use the waters of Lewis and Clark River for municipal water supply. This is to supply the town of Gearhart and adjacent towns. J. W. Hunt of Tillamook, for domestic supply with the waters of Fall Creek, to be diverted in Sec. 31, Tp. 1 S., R. 10 W. P. J. Trobough of Beaver for domestic supply with the waters of Trobough Springs located in Sec. 30 Tp. 3 S., R. 9 W. H. C. Sanders of Cloverdale, for irrigation of 12 acres, including domestic use. The water being diverted from Sanders Creek in Sec. 21, Tp. 4 S., R. 10 W. The Brighton Development Company of Portland, for domestic supply, diverting the water from Mess-house Creek in Sec. 16 Tp. 2 N., 10 W.

**Notice Closing Streams.**

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, That, WHEREAS, the State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners of the State of Oregon (as well as its predecessors, the Board of Fish Commissioners) has propagated and stocked, and is propagating and stocking the waters of Tillamook Bay and its tributaries, in Tillamook County, State of Oregon, with salmon fish, and

WHEREAS, said Tillamook Bay and its tributaries are frequented by salmon fish, and for the purpose of protecting the same the said State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners has decided to close a tributary of said Tillamook Bay, known as Hoquarton Slough, and its tributaries, above a point on said Hoquarton Slough 47 degrees 31 minutes West 2,013.7 feet from the section corner common to Sections 23, 24, 25 and 26, Township 1 South, Range 10 West of the Willamette Meridian—this point on said Hoquarton Slough being more particularly designated by posts erected by the Master Fish Warden warning the public; and also another tributary of said Tillamook Bay, known as Tillamook River, and its tributaries, above a point 100 feet below the lowermost portion of the mouth of Trask River, all being in Tillamook County, State of Oregon, to prevent fishing therein by any means whatever, except with hook and line, commonly called angling, for salmon fish during the periods of time hereinafter specified.

NOW, THEREFORE, NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN by said State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners that said tributary of Tillamook Bay, known as Hoquarton Slough, and its tributaries, above a point on said Hoquarton Slough 47 degrees 31 minutes West 2,013.7 feet from the section corner common to sections 23, 24, 25 and 26, Township 1 South, Range 10 West of the Willamette Meridian, is or are opened again to salmon fishing herein prohibited, as provided for under Section 5316 of Lord's Oregon Laws; and that said tributary of Tillamook River, and its tributaries, above a point 100 feet below the lowermost portion of the mouth of Trask River, are and each of them is hereby closed to fishing of any kind for salmon fish, except with hook and line, commonly called angling, from and after January 31, 1914, until said tributary of Tillamook Bay, known as Hoquarton Slough, and its tributaries, above a point on said Hoquarton Slough 47 degrees 31 minutes West 2,013.7 feet from the section corner common to sections 23, 24, 25 and 26, Township 1 South, Range 10 West of the Willamette Meridian, is or are opened again to salmon fishing herein prohibited, as provided for under Section 5316 of Lord's Oregon Laws; and it is and it shall be unlawful to fish for, or take or catch any salmon fish by any means whatever, except with hook and line, commonly called angling, in any of said waters during the said periods of time above specified.

Any and all persons whomsoever so fishing in violation of this notice will be prosecuted as by law provided.
