included J. S. Lamar's bundle of the new year's edition of the Oregonian. The post office staff managed to get it all sorted and cleaned up this morning.

Manual Borba, son of John Borba, had a close call of being seriously injured on Tuesday, when he was shot in the leg by the discharge of a 22 rifle in the hands of his brother, John. It was thought at first that he was seriously wounded, and he was brought to this city. Upon Dr. Boals examining the wound he found that it was only a slight flesh wound.

The W. R. C. held its regular meeting last Saturday afternoon, with all the new officers at their stations and a good attendance of members. It was decided to celebrate Lincoln's birthday the evening of Feb. 12 with a fitting program at the Christian church. The public is cordially invited. Next meeting will be held Feb. 14, at which time the birthdays of members occurring in February will be celebrated.

The Patsy and Sue H. Elmore, which had been bar bound at Astoria on account of the stormy weather, managed to get out and arrived here on Saturday morning. They brought a large quality of freight for the merchants, which was greatly needed, as some provisions had run out at the stores owing to the tie up on the rail road. The Patsy brought in 150 sacks of back paper mail, some of which was three weeks old. This was all sorted by Saturday night.

P. W. Todd was nominated for postmaster of Tillamook post office on Friday, to succeed W. F. Baker, whose time expired last month. A large number of the business men and others made an effort to have the latter re appointed, as the postmaster had given such general satisfaction to the patrons of the office, but being a political office Senators Chamberlain and Lane could not see their way clear to recommend the present postmaster, who, they admit, had strong endorsements from business men and patrons of the office. Pete Lamar, N. J. Meyer and J. A. Dahlgran were also aspirants.

This is a paragraph sent from Bay City and appeared in the Telegram: "County agate hunters are making some valuable finds in the chalcidones at Bayocean Park, three miles from this city. The recent heavy storms have washed the beach to a distance of several miles down to the gravel, uncovering some very rare specimens, and almost daily crowds of people from Tillamook County towns comb the beach and return, reporting great success." This appears to be a rehash of a similar paragraph which appeared in the Portland newspapers of finding agates at Newport. No one here appears to know of "daily crowds of people" going to Bayocean. The Telegram is being imposed up.

Cow Testing Association.

Prof. Graves, of the Dairy Department, who was to address the members of the Tillamook County Cow Testing Association on "A Balanced Ration For Milk Cows," failed to attend the meeting which was well attended. Mr. Kunze made the announcement that he offered \$50; C. I. Clough, \$30; Tillamook Feed Co. \$10 and another person who did not want their name mentioned \$10, making \$100 to be offered in prizes. Two cash prizes were offered, \$100 for the three best cows and \$50 for the three best 2 year old heifers. The officers were all re-elected, Chas. Kunze president; Joseph Durrer secretary and treasurer and John Shields vice president.
