In a monthly report of Dairy and Food Commissioner J. D. Mickle, he says: "Within the last few months the dairy industry of the state has felt a new influence; Oregon butter has encountered a new competitor. Owing to the reduction of the import duty on foreign butter, New Zealand and Australian butter has been coming into our state in considerable quantities. Mr.

Reed has expended about \$80,000 in improvements and he feels somewhat discouraged by the apathy of Tillamook County in not providing roads for the beach resorts, and also to the opposition that is manifest at Nehalem. Mr. Reed says one cannot imagine what the travel into this county would be if the county would improve the roads to the beach resorts, and he says it is a shame that Baygeean, which pays such a large amount of taxation, is deprived of a road, and for that and other reasons, he thinks those who have invested money improving beach property and beach lots are not receiving a square deal.

We are sorry to announce the death of Mrs. Jennie T. Gallentine, sister of Attorney C. W. Talmage, which occurred in Tillamook City on Thursday afternoon, after a short illness. The deceased was born in Kendall County, Ill., on September 6, 1851, and came to Oregon with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. Talmage, who located in Washington County, the following year. She was married to William P. Gallentine at Amity, Yamhill Co., Ore., in 1888 and two children survive her, Mrs. Dahlgren, of Tillamook, and Mrs. Hopkins, of Milwaukie, Ore. For the past five years she has been living with her brother, Attorney C. W. Talmage, of this city. The remains will be taken to McMinnville on Saturday and buried in the family lot there. The deceased was a kind, good woman, beloved by all who knew her, and she possessed the true Christian graces. The bereaved family have the sympathy of the community.

Contract Let for Garage.
A contract was let on Tuesday evening by Charley Kennedy to Delsman & Dolan to construct a modern concrete garage 40 x 70 feet on a site recently purchased by Kennedy on 2nd Ave. and 9th Street. The location is a good one and is on the main route of travel through the city.

The building will be of solid concrete construction, 40 x 70 feet, with walls 10 feet high and 6 inches thick, the floor being of solid concrete 6 inches thick. The building will be well lighted with numerous and generous size windows.

The contract calls for the building to be completed within forty days. Charley Kennedy's present garage is too small to accommodate his rapidly growing business, and the present building he will move across the street and in the rear of the building he has just let the contract for. There are at present over a hundred automobiles in Tillamook and vicinity and the tourist travel each year is increasing into this county on account of good roads, and we are of the opinion that Mr. Kennedy has made a move in the right line.
