FIRST NATIONAL BANK IN SPLENDID QUARTERS.

Is Located in New I.O.O.F. Building--Is a Credit to the City of Tillamook.

On Saturday the First National Bank began moving into its new quarters in the I. O. O. F. Building and now has things nicely settled and is doing business under more favorable conditions.

The new banking rooms are finished in genuine African ribbon grain mahogany with Verde Antique marble as a base trimming. The grill work in the mahogany fixtures is of brush bronze and of very neat design. The floor is laid in Mueller Mosaic tile and harmonizes very nicely with the fixtures and finishings of the bank.

The new banking rooms are lighted with the Mohrlite indirect lighting system which was installed by the West Coast Electric Co., of this city. These lights are of the latest ideas in lighting systems and have an unusual strength. They are the first of their kind to be installed in the city.

The entire equipment and fixtures of the bank are of a plain and substantial make and are up-to-date in every way in regard to their construction and arrangement.

The arrangement of the new bank and all its details are designed with a view to giving the customer every facility and comfort in the transaction of his or her business. The ventilation and heating is perfect and during the day the room has the best of light both for the customer and the officers and employees of the bank.

The vestibule, finished in mahogany makes a beautiful entrance, the doors being so arranged that in leaving or entering the bank you pass to the right. The fixture has a round corner and the lobby is beautifully trimmed and furnished in keeping with the rest of the bank.

There are three vaults, reinforced concrete throughout. Two of those vaults are on the first floor and one is on a second floor. One of the lower vaults is for the use of the bank only, and the other lower vault is for the exclusive use of patrons of the safe deposit department of the bank.

The massive doors on the two lower vaults were furnished by the Diebold Safe and Lock Co., and are the very latest and best doors that can be obtained. It is worth one's while to call at the bank and see how these large doors operate, and thereby secure some idea of the great security they afford the contents of the vaults.

The officers and directors of the bank are to be especially commended for the good taste and judgment displayed and results obtained in securing the new location and equipping the bank. Franchises Turned Down.

On Monday evening the city council met in regular session with the following officials present: Mayor, F. R. Beals; councilmen, Lamb, Broadhead, Keldson and Melchior; Recorder Todd and Attorney Botts.

The Committee on Ways and Means was instructed to purchase twelve chairs for the rest room being established by Mrs. Stillwell.

The Committee on Health was instructed to provide for the jail and put its furnishings in proper shape. The Committee on Streets made the following report in regard to the franchises asked for by the Electric Light & Fuel Co. and F. D. Small and D. C. Urie.

In the matter of the application of F. D. Small and D. C. Urie we made investigation, and think the interest of the city and people would be best served if a sufficient bond were filed as a guarantee of good faith of their intention in seeking the franchise. This statement is not intended to in the least cast any reflection upon these gentlemen, but we deem it a safe rule to follow before granting any franchise to any one for any purpose, unless the parties and their ability to promote the business is well known to the council.

We requested such a bond in this case and to the present it has been refused. Hence we report against granting the franchise. In the matter of application of the Tillamook Electric Light and Fuel Co. we think that the franchise should by all means contain a provision whereby the city, might, at any time it so desired, purchase the plant at a valuation to be fixed by some competent board such as the rail-road commission.

This right to purchase we have requested embodied in the franchise, and the company have declined to agree to such a provision, hence we report against the granting of said franchise. In our duties of investigating these franchises we have looked into the matter of rates and find that the rate charged here seem to be higher than those of other towns, and especially in those towns owning their own power plants.

The committee which was instructed to investigate the sewers asked for further time in which to make report. The Committee on Ways and Means was instructed to make special provision for the keeping of the records, and to partition off a small room in the corner of the hall where all documents can be securely cared for.

The matter of the consolidation of the Recorder's office and water rent collector's office was referred to Ways and Means Committee. The petition of E. E. Ginn for walk on Ninth Street and Stillwell Ave. was referred to committee.

The city attorney was instructed to draw up an ordinance making provision for restrictions in regard to fire hazards. Petition to improve Park St. was referred to committee.

The matter of lighting Stillwell Addition was referred to street committee. The city attorney was instructed to dismiss the case, City vs Ed Laughlin, upon the defendant paying costs and attorneys fees.

R. B. Hays was appointed to the office of City Recorder, on the recommendation of a petition signed by a large number of tax payers.
