Two Divorce Suits Filed.
Sarah Ann Larsen vs. Jans F. Larsen is a divorce suit filed in the circuit court. This is a similar suit filed last year, but which was withdrawn. These parties were married at Tillamook, Ore., on February 22nd, 1913, and the grounds upon which the plaintiff seeks divorce is that the defendant has treated his wife in such a cruel and inhuman manner, and heaped upon her several indignities as to render her life burdensome. Defendant is also accused of drinking to excess, being quarrelsome and abusive, striking the plaintiff and locking her out of the house so that she could not get her clothing and other personal property. He accused plaintiff of marrying defendant for his property, which she says is untrue. Plaintiff is wanting \$100 for suit money; \$100 for support during the pendency of the suit and one-third part of the real property.
Bess Pangborn vs. Quincy J. Pangborn, is a divorce suit filed in the circuit court. These parties were married at Burr Oak, Kansas, on Feb. 3rd, 1903, three children being born as a result of the union. Plaintiff accuses the defendant of cruel and inhuman treatment, and that the latter falsely and without cause or provocation accused plaintiff of unchaste and lascivious conduct. On June 10th, 1911, the defendant, at their home at Smith Center, Kan., told the plaintiff that he was going to take the minor children down town to some place of amusement, but instead of doing so brought them to Tillamook without her knowledge. Plaintiff asks that the marriage be annulled and she be given the custody of all the minor children. She also prays that the defendant pay to the clerk each month such sum as the court may deem meet and equitable.

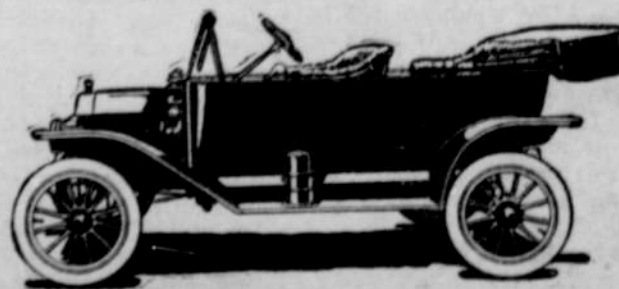
