Passing Comment.

The reported purpose of Representative Stanley to introduce a bill that will take out of the hands of the attorney general of the United States the power to direct prosecutions for violations of the Sherman anti-trust law and vest it in the various United States district attorneys has been commended on the ground that the president of the United States once declared that he would not construe the purchase of stock of one concern, during a panic, by a competing concern such a violation of the law as would justify prosecution. But those who have greeted the announcement with glad acclaim seem to have reflected little on the administration of justice.

Delinquent Tax List of Last Half Payments, 1913.

This advertised list of delinquent taxes for the year of 1913, is in pursuance of an act of the State Legislature which is embodied in Chapter 275 of the GENERAL LAWS OF THE 1911 SESSION. The taxes on the following advertised real property, situated in Tillamook County, Oregon, became delinquent on Monday, October 7th, 1913, and are subject to a penalty of ten per cent, and interest at the rate of 12 per cent per annum from Monday, April the 7th, 1913, until they shall have been paid, any day after the expiration of six months after the taxes charged against the following real property are delinquent, the Sheriff is authorized upon demand of any person making application, to issue to them a certificate of delinquency, upon payment of taxes, penalty, interest and cost of advertising. Certificates of delinquency shall bear interest from the date of issuance until redeemed at the rate of fifteen per cent per annum.
