The Fair Board is making the premiums as general as possible, and we hope there will be a lively contest for the honors.

One of our citizens want to know the reason why men are employed every day to scoup up the filth and muck on the paved streets and not in other parts of the city. This is a question for Freddie to answer. And by the way who is responsible for the chips left on the planked street across the slough, Freddie?

It will be noticed that the Fair Board has designated the name "Cheesarians" for the marching club at the county fair, at the request of the Commercial Club. Will some of our enterprising dry goods merchants dress up a model "Cheesarian" as planned by the board? And do not forget one for the ladies, for they should take an active part in the marching club.

We suppose it is going to be a case of "Show Me" with the Grange exhibits at the county fair as to which Grange will carry off the honors. Fairview Grange has some live wires when it comes to preparing and arranging a display, and so have the Nehalem and Nestucca Granges. The prizes are worth striving for, but the honor of carrying them off will cause the greatest rejoicing.

One of our citizens, who was a little inquisitive, wanted to know how much money the editor made for writing up and publishing the interesting account of the dairy industry in this county last year. Nix. It was gotten up to advertise the county and boost Tillamook's famous cheese, and we do not know of any literary matter that the Fair Board could use to better advantage in advertising the county than printing it in circular form. So many persons, it seems, want to divert the \$1000 that was appropriated for advertising for other purposes, if they succeed there will be little money left to pay for live and up-to-date advertising that the editor compiled last week.

Taking everything into consideration, the dairy industry in Tillamook County last year was highly satisfactory, and it is not out of place to commend and congratulate the dairymen on their success, with the same compliments paid the directors of the co-operative factories and those who have been instrumental in bringing the year's business to such a financial success. In this connection, the names of Carl Haberlach and F. W. Christensen, the former for keeping the price of cheese at a good stiff figure, and the latter supervising the make and the grade of cheese. Both are to be commended, for they have made good, with everybody feeling satisfied with the year's work. And in this connection it is only right that the cheese makers at the different factories should receive a word of praise, for it is the superior, high grade cheese that plays an important part and commands the highest price.

For a number of years Oregon have elected politicians to this office, and the State is receiving bad notoriety on account of West using public money to bring himself into the limelight. But, somehow, the people prefer a politician or an attorney to a person like Dr. James Withycombe who has devoted the best part of his life to improving the agricultural resources of Oregon, giving useful information to thousands of farmers. Taxpayers complain at this time of year about high taxation, and they are high, but as long as they prefer politicians for governor instead of some sensible, practical, successful person, they are not entitled to much sympathy. The trouble with so many voters they like to be tickled by the politicians and it is not out of place to refer the taxpayers to the long list of tax eating commissions that have come into existence in Oregon to make soft jobs for a lot of politicians.

Bro. Trombley, now a full-fledged, free trade Democrat, says: "The ranks of the Democratic party should be greatly increased by loyal men who are willing to stand by the party that stands by the people as a whole." Gee, wiz, isn't that a great spill to fool the people? Let us see how the Democratic party stands by the people of Tillamook County. It placed on the free list milk, cream, fish, cattle, wool, lumber and a number of other things and lowered the tariff on butter and cheese, and, in consequence, all kinds of agricultural products are being dumped into the United States from foreign countries, which compete with and lower the price of the home product. For an illustration, the new tariff knocked the bottom out of the price of butter and eggs and demoralized the market, and it is more than probable that the cheese market will encounter the same experience the coming year. With these conditions confronting them, we cannot understand how a dairyman can affiliate and support the Democratic party when their products are placed on the free list and the big manufacturers are given protection. It is plain that the Democratic party is not standing by the farmer, but Bro. Trombley says it stands by the people. Then, according to his own logic the dairymen of Tillamook county are not classed amongst the people, for the farmer and the dairy interererts of the country have been thrown overboard by the Democratic party. Is that standing by the people, Bro. Trombley?

The progressive citizens at Nehalem are wide-awake to the future development of that part of the county. Having been successful in bar improvements the Port of Nehalem is now turning attention to the improvement of the bay, and will use the dredge at this port for that purpose. As a result of the improvement a saw mill costing \$500,000 cut its first log last week and other large timber owners are contemplating the erection of saw mills equally as large. These facts ought to arouse the citizens here, for instead of the dredger being taken to Nehalem it should, if the citizens were alive to the situation, be deepening the channel between this city and the bay. But there is no money available for this purpose and the channel is filling up, while the freight vessels are experiencing some difficulty in reaching this city. Should the vessels stop calling at this city the coming summer it will greatly increase the cost of shipping cheese. We wish we could impress upon our citizens in this vicinity the importance of improving the channel between this city and the bay. Surely some plan can be devised whereby the different interests can get together and agree on some plan. The improvement can be made without bonding, for if a limited amount of money was used every year, in a few years the channel would be deepened and there would be no more trouble about vessels reaching this city. With the prospect of free trade reducing the price of cheese and the prospect of having to pay more for shipping it, may, probably, have the effect of bringing about a happy solution of this difficult problem. Are we going to remain idle and indifferent while other parts of the county are wide awake and progressive? It is more necessary for the commercial life

of the central part of the county and the dairy industry to have a deep channel to this city than anything else. It is and should be made the paramount issue, for a county fair, fine buildings, paved streets, good roads, etc., are all insignificant to the importance of a deep channel to this city. We plead with those who have opposed this improvement to give it further consideration with a view of getting together and agreeing upon some plan that is satisfactory to all.

Hard Swim Fatal to Cavill.

SEATTLE, Wash., March 1.—Arthur Cavill, the Australian swimmer who was the first man to swim the Golden Gate at San Francisco, and who was recognized as the champion swimmer of the world from 1895 to 1900, died of exhaustion today soon after he had been taken from the water after an unsuccessful attempt to swim across the Seattle harbor, a distance of three miles. Cavill started from the west side of the bay and was swimming toward a pier at the foot of Spring street, on the central water front. The water was cold and a strong wind and adverse currents took him out of his course, so that he swam fully four miles in the hour and ten minutes he was in the water. He was followed by a launch and rowboat, which stood by to give assistance. When Cavill was only 500 yards from the finish, where a large crowd had assembled, those in the rowboat saw him quit the powerful stroke with which he was swimming and lapse into a gentle paddle as if resting. When the boatman rowed to him Cavill grasped the gunwale and then became unconscious. He was picked up and taken to the launch, where medical attendance was given him, but he died without regaining consciousness. The physician who attended Cavill said the swimmer virtually was frozen to death. "His skin was like ice," said the physician, "and his circulation was retarded that his heart stopped." The temperature of the water was 46 degrees above zero.
