The assistants in Tax Collector B. L. Beals' office informed us this morning that the boss was as cranky as a mule, owing to a bad cold. He is cranky and scared to death for fear that Governor West will send Miss Hobbs to Tillamook and have him arrested by Sheriff Crenshaw for violating the law in not allowing the 3 per cent rebate to taxpayers. That is what is troubling the tax collector, and there is no danger of his deputies catching the cranky fever.
L. G. Freeman came in last week from Corvallis, where he has a farm. He is complaining on account of the free trade policy of the Democratic party. Mr. Freeman informs us that his 200 acre farm near Corvallis, although bottom land, was not very profitable last year. He sent 50 boxes of choice apples to the cannery, which cost him 37c. to pick, wrap and box, for which he received 5c. per box, consequently he lost the apples and was out 32c. a box as well. He says if it wasn't for his Tillamook farm he would have done.

Minnie Kinney vs George Kinney is a divorce suit filed in the Circuit Court. These parties were married in Denver, Col., on the 8th August, 1906. The grounds upon which the divorce is sought is the cruel and inhuman manner of defendant, who while grossly intoxicated struck and beat the plaintiff without cause, driving her away from their apartments in Tillamook City. Defendant had also threatened to kill the plaintiff and fearing great bodily harm, was forced to flee. The plaintiff ask the court that she resume her maiden name, Minnie Coffey.
Commissioner H. M. Farmer has decided that he will not be a candidate for re-election at the primary election. Mr. Farmer finds that, no matter how hard county officials may strive to do the right and square thing by the people, there are those who unjustly criticize, and for that reason he does not want the position again. Mr. Farmer says he can retire with the consciousness of serving the people faithfully and with the satisfaction of having accomplished many good improvements in his district, the road and bridge improvements being of a substantial character and a great benefit to the South part of the county. The names of Will Christensen and W. M. Owens have been mentioned as probable candidates for county commissioner.
Attorney T. B. Handley will be a candidate for joint representative for Tillamook and Yamhill counties, at the primary election, on the republican ticket, a position which he held in the last state legislature, his constituents being well satisfied with his record, for it is said of him that he was one of the hardest worked members of the legislature, and in recognition of his services Governor West wanted to appoint him county attorney, but as there was a question raised whether the governor could appoint a legislator to a lucrative office created by the legislature in which took part, Mr. Handley decided he did not want the office of county attorney with a "cloud" hanging over it, and so informed the governor.

Judge Webster Holmes and Mrs. Holmes returned to the city on Monday and Miss Ruth on Tuesday. Judge Holmes will be a candidate at the primary election in May on the democratic ticket for the position he now holds. He has made a rule since he has been on the bench to decide cases when they are tried, and not take them under advisement for several months. This is one of the important planks in his platform, and it is a good one, for cases drag too long in the courts without judges prolonging them. We give below Judge Holmes' platform: "If I am nominated and elected I will, during my term of office, continue to discharge the duties of Circuit Judge in the same manner as I have during the term of my appointment by the governor, viz., Give the people and litigants the very best administration of which I am capable; render prompt decisions; see that all have fair trials, without favor or partiality, and maintain the dignity of the court. Present no imbecile; give my best efforts; protect interests of litigants; prompt decisions."
Demands 3 Per Cent Rebate on His Taxes.
Attorney L. M. Travis, of Eugene, in paying his taxes, has entered a protest claiming that the law is unconstitutional. He says: "I wish to further inform you that Circuit Judge Henry E. McGinn in his decision handed down March 7, 1914 decided that the tax law passed by the legislature of 1913 is unconstitutional for the reason that the law has never been submitted to the voters at a general election, and that, therefore, the old law is still in effect. Under the provision of the old law I am entitled to a rebate of three per cent when taxes are paid on or before the 15th day of March, 1914. Therefore I am paying this under protest so far as the payment of the full amount is concerned, but claim a rebate of 3 per cent on \$123.25 in the sum of \$3.69. I have no doubt but that Judge McGinn's decision will be affirmed, and upon the affirmation thereof will ask you kindly to send me the rebate in the sum of \$3.69."

New Postmaster in Charge.

P. W. Todd, who was recently appointed postmaster, received his commission on Friday and took charge of the office on Sunday, relieving Walter E. Baker, who made good as postmaster and made many friends by his courteous manner and the satisfaction with which he ran the office.
The business of the Tillamook post office made a fine increase during Mr. Baker's tenure of office. In the four years there was an increase in business of about \$1,000 every year and he was instrumental in having the first free rural delivery and the first postal savings bank established in the county. The end of the present month, which is the fiscal year, will place the office in the second class in July, which will increase the salary of the postmaster to \$2,000 per annum and give him additional money for clerk hire. As soon as this takes place it will be "free" for everybody to aspire to the postmastership, as a change of a post office from one class to another causes a vacancy in the postmastership. With another increase of \$1,500 in the receipts of the office, this will give Tillamook City a free delivery. The growth of business at the post office is a true index of the growth of the city, and the showing made at the Tillamook post office during the past four years is highly gratifying, and was a surprise to the postal department at Washington, for the postmaster was called upon several times to explain to them the reason that the receipts of the office were constantly on the increase. The ex-postmaster will engage in newspaper work in this city, and put in a typesetting machine.

Circuit Court.

Judge Webster Holmes held circuit court on Tuesday when he disposed of several cases.
Becka Caples vs. Frank Long, Sr. et al was a suit to recover money, and a judgment against the defendants for \$561.71 was rendered.
Montgomery Turner vs A. H. Rugar et al which was a suit to recover \$15,900, a judgment was entered in favor of plaintiff.
In the case of the Hotel Tillamook, the judge granted ten days in which to amend the complaint and ten day to reply to the same.
