J. H. Dunstan was chosen president and Attorney H. T. Botts, secretary. The club had another meeting on Wednesday evening, when several matters pertaining to obtaining expert advice was agreed to.

The oldest boy was loading a 22 Winchester rifle, and at a time when the weapon was pointed in the direction of Kenneth it accidentally discharged. The bullet entered the boy's chest and passed near the heart, lodging near the backbone between two ribs. Dr. Boals made a hurried trip to the boy's home, arriving 20 minutes after the shooting. He believes that the boy will pull through.

The County Court has two petitions, one asking that it appoint J. C. Smith, Mayor of Wheeler, county commissioner to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Geo. R. Edner, and the other asking the court to appoint F. D. Thompson, of Nehalem. It seems that Mr. Thompson is not in favor of the proposed road from Wheeler to Nehalem but Mr. Smith is, and it is upon the building of this road that the people of Nehalem are divided, as it is claimed by some that Nehalem has one good road from Mohler and on that account the proposed new road is opposed, while, on the other hand, those living at Nehalem point out the distance saved, that being the shortest route to the railroad.
Roy C. Jones, who was appointed to take charge of the field, farm and demonstration work in Tillamook County, arrived on Tuesday. He comes well recommended for the work. He is a graduate of the University of Vermont, Dairy Department, and has had some five or six years of practical experience in dairy work, and has been connected with the Agricultural College of Montana, and has made good in the department of dairy production, which includes the feeding and management of dairy stock along the lines which will be useful to this county. Prof. Barr, of the Oregon Agricultural College, came in with him and Prof. H. T. French is expected in on Saturday to start the work.

As an illustration as to the reason outgoing tonnage from Tillamook does not compare to tonnage from other points where a less concentrated product is shipped, the following may be cited: Carl Haberlach shipped one car of cheese this week, valued at \$3,632.29. This amount of money would have paid for fully one hundred minimum cars of baled alfalfa hay at shipping point in Idaho or parts of Eastern Oregon last fall. It would also pay for something like thirty minimum cars of oats or other feed.
