The receipts of the Tillamook Postoffice for last year amounted to \$8,709.55, being an increase of \$1,252.84 over the previous year. This increase will place the office in the second class, and will give Postmaster Todd a salary of \$2,000 a year with additional money for clerk hire amounting to \$1900. All that is now allowed for clerk hire is \$600 a year, and to keep up the work of the office the postmasters have had to pay for assistance out of their salaries. Assistants in the future will be under civil service rules. The amount of money orders issued every month from the Tillamook office will average \$5,000, or about \$60,000 for the fiscal year.

Public School Will Have New Principal.
The School Board has obtained the services of a young man for principal of the public school in this city, having engaged Prof. Karl W. Onthank, of Hood River, for that position. He graduated from Hood River in 1909 and the University of Oregon in 1913, being a candidate for M. A. in that university in 1913. He was a teacher of physics in the Eugene High school, and reader of English at the University, a salaried office in 1912-13, and from 1913-14 principal of Frankton High School and superintendent of grades. He has taken part in high school debating teams, and was connected with football, baseball and basketball teams at various times. He was reporter and city editor of the Oregon Emerald; assistant editor of the Oregon Monthly, was secretary of the University Y. M. C. A. and president of the Alpha Tau Omega, Academy Fraternity.
The other teachers employed are: Mrs. H. Hanson, history; Miss Ueland, domestic science; Miss Ada V. McDowell of Denver, commercial subjects; Mrs. Clara Burge, 1st grade; Mrs. Laura Leach, 2nd grade; Miss Harriett Gaylord, 3rd grade; Miss M. F. Dunstan, 4th grade; and Miss Lena M. Mahn, of Mo., 6th grade.

Death of W. W. Wiley.
The announcement of the death of W. W. Wiley, a former School Superintendent of Tillamook County, reached the city by wire on Sunday from La Mesa, Cal., where he expired that morning. A previous telegram stated that Mr. Wiley was in a critical condition and that the doctor held out no hopes of his recovery. Heart trouble was the cause of death, the deceased suffering as well with tuberculosis. He went to California about 18 months ago for the benefit of his health, and, like most consumptives, he appeared to be improving at times and then relapsed.
Deceased was a son in law of Mr. and Mrs. C. N. Drew, having married Miss Frankie Drew. Deceased leaves, besides his wife, four children. Mr. and Mrs. Wiley were members of the Presbyterian church when they resided here, and the deceased was an active member of the Masonic order. No one took more interest in the public school than the deceased, for he thought nothing was too good for them. The remains are being brought to Beaverton, Ore., for burial.
Mrs. Drew and Miss Lelia Drew will attend the funeral, after which they will bring Mrs. Wiley and her family to this city. The bereaved widow and relatives have the heartfelt sympathy of the people of this city.

Legal 'Beer' Made from New Powder.

EUGENE, Or., April 7.—"Dry beer," represented as capable of producing as complete intoxication as the "real" article, puzzled Eugene and county officers to-day, following the arrest of C. E. Cook by a police officer as he was attempting to sell canned powdered "beer." He claims to have been selling the material about Lane County for three weeks, to have 10 agents in the field, and defies the officers to stop him.
R. S. Bryson, Police Judge, before whom he was brought, discharged him for lack of grounds on which to hold him. District Attorney J. M. Devers attempted to hold the man, but was able to do nothing. "There is no way to stop him from selling materials with which to make beer," stated the District Attorney, "providing he has the proper peddler's license."
The officers declare that the local option law specifies the sale of intoxicating "liquors" and this not

being a liquor, it does not fall under the law.
Cook represents that the powder when mixed with water will make real "alcoholic beer."
