**Editorial Snap Shots.**

Visitors to Tillamook City are quite numerous, with every indication that this will keep up until the fall.

Out of a registration of 1589, 1,000 are Republicans, which is a good indication that the free trade party will go down to defeat in November.

Those horrid men who closed up meeting places just as Easter bonnets were the absorbing and most interesting subject just now with the ladies.

What with free trade to reduce the price of everything raised on the farm and denying our coasting vessels free toll through the canal, Bro. Trombley is having a hard time hanging on to the tail of the Democratic mule and with the snap shot man prodding him.

When it became known that the schools, theatres and the churches were ordered closed last week, there were those who wanted to close the saloons. They must have overlooked the little incident and the pre-election promise that the saloons were not to be interfered with.

Keep your weather eye on the women who have registered as Republicans, Mr. Candidate. It looks as if they held a boosters' or a revival meeting last week, for 43 good, sensible women joined the G.O.P., while only two women registered as Democrats, three as Prohibitionists and one belonging to no party. A Woman's Republican Club in this county is in order to induce other women to register and help the good cause along. The Republican sisters did well last week, their numbers reaching 252. Women who have joined the other parties are: Democratic, 62; Prohibitionists, 62; Progressives, 3; independent, 25; no party, 6.

President Wilson whipped a majority of the Democratic members of the House into line and it refused American coasting vessels free toll through the canal. Just consider, for one moment, what our school master president is doing. Having placed the farmer's product on the free list, he also placed lumber on the free list. Notwithstanding that the United States built the canal, American coasting vessels have to pay toll and American lumbermen are placed in competition with lumber manufactured in Canada largely by Hindu labor. We hope the people see the mistake they made when they placed the free trade party and school master president in power, as it is estimated by those in a position to know that owing to Hindu labor in Canadian lumber yards and Chinese crews on English tramp freighters, the Canadian lumber manufacturers will be able to take it through the canal and lay it down on the Atlantic at \$4.00 a thousand less than what it can be produced from saw mills in Oregon and Washington.

With Tillamook shore lines skirted with charming beaches, with her mountains gorged by trout-laden streams, and with her vast expanse of fertile valleys, this county will welcome the summer tourist for their annual outing. Noted for her timber and famous as a dairy and cheese country, we are about to take on new honors. Within the past week 22

schools of Tillamook county have organized as many garden clubs, due to the efforts of Field Worker N. C. Maris, of the state department of public instruction, aided by Supt. W. S. Buel. The school children will find a ready market for their vegetables among the transient guests of the mid-summer months, as well as \$250 in prizes for the school children's exhibits at the county fair. Their undertakings will be educational as well as profitable. It now remains to be seen which school can make the best exhibit and carry off most prizes. That our visitors will have their stay made more delightful by this feature of the county's attractions is a pleasant contemplation.

The timber men, of course, are greatly interested in the question of depriving American coasting vessels of free toll, for this is a most serious matter for them with millions of dollars tied up in timber and ripe to be turned into lumber. It is, in fact, a serious condition that confronts them, for with lumber on the free list, and cheap labor in Canadian lumber yards and on foreign vessels, the lumbermen of this country cannot compete, for there is a difference of \$4.00 a thousand on lumber in favor of Canada by the time it reaches the Atlantic coast in vessels going through the canal. This means a boom for the Canadian lumber industry and blights the hopes of our own lumber industry at a time when new industries were in contemplation. The outlook does not look inviting for the lumber industry when Canada can undersell lumber manufactured here. This condition of affairs the Democratic party is responsible for and was brought about by placing lumber on the free list. This is sure to retard to growth of the lumber industry of Tillamook county, for it is safe to say that very little activity will take place here until conditions have changed.

Our attention has been called to a vote cast in the United States senate by Senator Chamberlain, who voted to lease coal lands in Montana to a subsidiary of a railroad company, which is better told in news reports from Washington:

By the narrow margin of one vote the senate defeated a flank attack on the conservation policy engineered by Sen. Myers of Montana, as chairman of the committee on public lands.

By a vote of 38 to 27, a joint resolution which would have allowed the sale or lease of approximately 2,000 acres of coal lands in Montana to the Republic Coal Co., a subsidiary, selling its total output to the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway, was defeated. "I venture to say," said Senator Poindexter in the debate, "that this coal will be worth on board cars at the mines \$5 a ton, and that it can be mined for \$2 a ton, which would leave a profit to the Republic Coal Co., or to the Milwaukee Railroad, which owns the Republic Coal Co., of \$3 a ton, which would amount to \$30,000,000 if the geological survey estimate is correct."

The resolution, if passed, could have been made the "precedent" for similar legislation granting mineral of other lands to other corporations, whenever it could be shown that they "needed" the lands for business purposes.

Senator Chamberlain's name is included in the 27 who voted wrong and in favor of the railroads. And when the new tariff law was voted on Chamberlain voted to place lumber, cream, milk, fish, etc., on the free list.

We do not want to place anything in the way of building the proposed road from Wheeler to Nehalem, and as the present County Court seems to have come to the conclusion that it will not start any new projects, it will be a matter for the next County Court to wrestle with. In the meantime we hope the people in the first road district will get together and unite for or against this road, as that district appears to be equally divided about the wisdom of constructing the road. There is no immediate necessity for this road to be constructed, for Wheeler has one wagon road, with railroad and water facilities, which can be reached with auto in a little over two hours from this city, while Nehalem has good wagon roads and water transportation to the railroad. Everybody will admit that the building of the road will be a good improvement, and whenever it is started it should be completed as soon as possible. To do so this year, we are informed, would deprive other parts of the district of road improvements. The County Court has heard strong arguments in

favor of the improvement, and equally as strong against it, some timber men favoring it and others protesting. With the growth of that part of the county, it is only a matter of a few years, anyway, before the road is built, but in the meantime, however, some plan may be agreed upon to obtain the necessary funds, with the people of the first road district all pulling together for the improvement.

Why is it that people become greatly scared whenever small pox makes its appearance, even though it be in a light form? Not because of any serious epidemic in this county, for we do not know of anyone dying from that disease in Tillamook. It is also well to mention that of the few cases of the small pox in recent years only two or three have been of a serious nature. Typhoid fever, diphtheria and other infectious diseases have claimed victims in this county, but they did not cause people to become scared. We believe that it is right to take proper precautions in all cases of infectious diseases, but we fail to see why people make so much fuss about small pox, as we do not know of a fatality from it in this county, and not get scared about other infectious diseases, which have killed a good many. Probably why so many persons are scared about small pox is because they know or have read about the ravages of the disease, when it used to carry off victims by the hundreds, and thousands in tropical climates. That rarely ever occurs now. The snap shot man thinks that small pox germs in this county are like bed bugs. Neither can live in Tillamook climate, and that is the reason Tillamookers are not annoyed by bed bugs and no Tillamookers known to succumb to small pox. If it was the proper stunt to close the schools, churches and theatres, other places should have been closed. If the same thing was done at the appearance of every infectious disease these places would be closed most of the time, notwithstanding that is Tillamook the healthiest county in the state. We hope that our readers will not get scared in future when there is no logical reason for doing so.

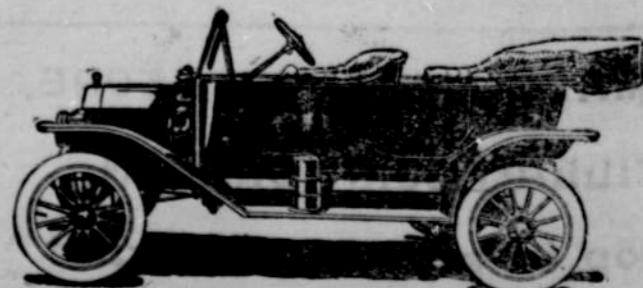
