### Talk to Parent-Teachers.

Dr. Rebec, of the Extension Department of the Oregon University at Eugene, gave a very instructive and pleasing address at the Parent-Teacher meeting last Monday evening. His talk in the main was along educational lines. He compared the course of study of the schools that were first introduced into the country with the course of study to which we are now drifting. He regards the change of the courses from that of the study of Greek, Latin, etc., to that of vocational training, that of domestic science, domestic art, manual training, agriculture, etc., as a change much to the benefit of the boys and girls. He also touched upon the social and business changes of the country to such a degree as to show that we must of necessity change our school courses to keep up with the progress along these and other lines.

Supt. Buel and Prof. Buchanan requested him to talk to the school student body Tuesday morning. He spoke to them about the difference in the opportunities of one starting in life at the present time compared with those afforded our parents when they started in life, why they got along quite well at that time, and we, who are starting now are unable to succeed with the same educational qualifications. All were delighted with Dr. Rebec and we hope we shall have him with us many times in the future. He addressed the members of the Fairview Grange Wednesday afternoon.

### DECLARED A BANKRUPT.

#### C. R. Funk Another Victim Who Struggled with High Priced Mortgaged Land.

Charles R. Funk has on his own application been declared a bankrupt, and a meeting of his creditors to present and prove their claims, set at Portland on Tuesday, April 28, at 10 a.m., before Referee G. C. Murphy.

The papers filed by Mr. Funk show the following list of creditors, Secured: First National Bank, \$77.00; A. A. Apsley, \$350.00; H. H. Hayward, \$40.00; F. S. Whitehouse, \$83.33; James A. Biggs, \$2616.67. Unsecured: John Sanders, \$135.00; A. C. Goodrich, \$50.00; Mr. Alger, \$28; A. A. Apsley, \$25.00; James A. Biggs, \$500.00; Simmons Bros., \$15; J. S. Lamar, \$21.28; E. A. Ball, \$34.75; Ray & Co., \$20.00; L. Hanes and Son, \$24.00; W. A. Williams, \$15.40; Tillamook Feed Co., \$182.47; Rosenberg Bros., \$81.72; Tillamook Mercantile Co., \$87.85; A. A. Pennington, \$26.88; Alex McNair & Co., \$69.07; King & Smith Co., \$3.65; Grant Mills, \$131.50; P. W. Todd, claim for damages, \$750.00. Of which \$3450 is for notes and mortgages on a 50 acre ranch purchased in 1910 by Mr. Funk on which he only paid down at the time of purchase \$50, probably the real estate agent's commission. Part of the notes bear 10 per cent interest.

Mr. Funk's assets consist of cash on hand \$2.00; 18 chickens, \$9.00; boat, \$25.00; back, \$25.00; and a team, wagon, harness, household goods, one cow, farming tools etc; all of which he claims as exempt under the law. The ranch may be of the value of the mortgages on it for purchase money and no more.

Mr. Funk had \$96 due him from the County for road work done last March but that was garnished by one of his creditors.

Mr. Funk came to our county four years ago, out of debt, a good, honest, hard-working, sober man, which he has been ever since. He was talked into buying a high priced piece of land on credit, with no buildings or improvements on it. He had a wife and daughter to support and went to work to improve the land and put buildings on it, all of which he will now lose as they go with the ranch. He has lost all, all his hard work for four years and our local merchants, who have been holding him up, while he spent all the money he earned on his ranch, will lose probably all their accounts. The ranch had no road into it, up in the hills, and have to walk a mile to get to it. No one can blame Mr. Funk, he states he has worked 365 days every year, 18 hours a day, to try to make ends meet, but getting in debt deeper every day. His wife and daughter have also worked hard.

Judge C. R. Worrall, attorney, to whom he went for counsel, advised him to turn over all he had to his creditors and begin life over again, keep out of debt, and pay his creditors up later as fast as he could, that a man's first duty was to his family. Mr. Worrall states to us that Mr. Funk is honest, and if given a chance to live and work, he will later pay his debts, but that Mr. Funk was driven to do as he

has, by being sued and his wages attached as fast as he earned a dollar, and costs piled upon him, with not a dollar left to buy or pay for something to eat for his family and team.

### THE BEACH ROAD GETS A KNOCK OUT.

#### Supreme Court Recommends Proceedings be Done Over.

The Supreme Court in the case of N. McMillan, appellant, vs. County Court of Tillamook, involving location of a county road, reversed the decision of the lower court.

This is a special proceeding by N. McMillan to review the action of the County Court of Tillamook County in the matter of locating a county road across the premises of the plaintiff and not allowing him any damages caused thereby. A writ of review was issued by order of the Circuit Court for this County and directed to the defendants, and in obedience to such command the proceedings relating to the undertaking to establish the highway were certified and sent up. The trial court considering the matters dismissed the trial and the plaintiff appealed.

The location of the road is described as follows: Commencing at a point 30 feet south of the Sw corner of block 5 in Garibaldi, said point being in section 21, tp 1 north, range 10 west, as shown on the records of the County Clerk of Tillamook County, and running thence in a northwesterly and north easterly direction, parallel to the right of way of the P. R. & N. railway, as near as possible, using streets of the towns as now platted along the proposed route of said road where possible, and terminating 20 feet north of the Nw corner of block 23 in Wheeler, said point being in section 2, tp 2 north, range 10 west.

In an opinion rendered by Justice J. Moore, and concurred in by Justices Eakin, Burnett and Ramsey, the judgment of the lower Court is reversed and the cause remanded with directions to set aside all proceedings undertaken to establish the county road. There is this recommendation, however, in the decision, which is as follows: "A sense of fair dealing demands that these proceedings should be set aside in order that another petition may be filed, notices thereof be given, proof given as required by law and a review and survey of the proposed route be made."

Attorney S. S. Johnson was atorney for Mr. McMillan.
