Editorial Snap Shots.

Cut rates by the auto stages
 between this city and Clover-
 dale is a good thing, temporari-
 ly, for the traveling public, but
 poor business if passengers are
 carried at a loss.

It will not help matters, Bro.
 Effenberger, to mislead the tax-
 payers as to the amount of
 money it will take to construct
 the proposed road from Wheeler
 to Nehalem. Tell the truth,
 Bro., if it does shame the devil.

Isn't Bro. Trombley a peach
 as a free trade booster? We
 wonder what the dairymen, the
 fishermen, and the lumbermen
 of Tillamook County think of a
 man who boosted for a party
 that placed their industries on
 the free list? The tariff law was
 changed to lower the price of
 everything raised on the farm,
 and also to allow fish and lum-
 ber to come in free from Can-
 ada.

The timber interests and lum-
 ber men of the Northwest are
 sending delegations to Wash-
 ington to protest against the
 action of President Wilson to
 deprive American coastwise ves-
 sels of free toll through the
 canal. The Democratic party
 threw the bars down and now
 the farmers' and the lumber
 men's products are placed
 in competition with cheap labor
 and products of foreign coun-
 tries.

There is merit in the sugges-
 tion that a gymnasium be erect-
 ed between the two school
 buildings, to be used by the
 pupils of the school during the
 day and by the young people of
 the district in the evenings. It
 would be an advantage to the
 pupils as well as the young peo-
 ple of the city. As the cost of
 a gymnasium would be compar-
 atively small to the amount
 of good it would be to the young
 people, it has our hearty
 endorsement.

There were two cases in the
 circuit court that should never
 have been taken into court—the
 cases against the P. R. & N. and
 Dr. Boals—that took some of the
 taxpayers' money to try. In such
 cases either one of two things
 occur. Clients withhold some of
 the facts from their legal ad-
 visors or attorneys are after
 "blood money" from those who
 are sued. That is not all, for it
 is drawing "blood money" from
 the taxpayers who have to pay
 for trying trumpety cases as
 well as those who have to de-
 fend them.

The Fair Board has one fea-
 ture for the county fair, called
 "Better Babies Contest." We
 move that the Fair Board en-
 lighten us on this subject and
 inform us what is the matter
 with the present babies? Per-
 haps they have an idea that the
 babies would be better if they
 did not use their lungs so often
 and relieve the parents of walk-
 ing the room at nights with a
 vigorous squaller in their arms.
 If this is the object the Fair
 Board has in view, then every
 young person who contemplate
 matrimony ought to feel grate-
 ful to the board for better be-
 haved babies at night.

The Albany Democrat of a
 recent issue prophesied that if
 Senator Chamberlain returned
 to Oregon and made a campaign
 he would easily defeat R. A.
 Booth. Maybe, but are not the
 voters of Oregon likely to in-
 quire of Chamberlain what be-
 came of his non-partisan plat-

form on which he ran and was
 selected six years ago? Are
 they not liable to inquire why,
 in view of said non-partisanship,
 he lined up with the Democrats
 and voted for a tariff bill which
 put all of Oregon's principal
 products, including, lumber,
 wool and farm produce, on the
 free list? The fact of the mat-
 ter is that Chamberlain is a
 Democrat pure and simple and
 nothing else. After settling
 that point it might be well to
 remember that Democratic tar-
 riff policies are bad for Oregon.
 No one is so foolhardy as to dis-
 pute that.

This is how Bayocean people
 feel about road improvements.
 Although they are not knocking
 improvements, they think they
 are entitled to a wagon road on
 account of the large amount of
 taxes they have paid and the
 large amount of money expend-
 ed in improvements. No one
 can deny the justice and logic of
 their contention, for a road to
 Bayocean should have been con-
 structed and completed before
 this. A bridge was built and a
 road was constructed to give
 the south side of Nehalem bay
 a road that was greatly needed,
 and even another road is de-
 manded, but Bayocean and the
 south side of Tillamook bay,
 equally needing a road, is with-
 out one today. In justice to all
 sections of the county, as well as
 a square deal, would it be right
 to give the south side of Ne-
 halem bay two roads before the
 south side of Tillamook bay is
 given one road?

Selling high priced land to
 people with little money with
 the object of making a commis-
 sion cuts some figure with busi-
 ness men, as well as losses to busi-
 ness men. We have a case be-
 fore us where an industrious
 person bought a piece of high
 priced land some few years ago,
 paying \$50 down and then giv-
 ing a mortgage for the full
 amount of the land. It may not
 surprise some of our citizens to
 hear what we have to add to
 this incident. After struggling
 with the place and endeavoring
 to improve it, this is his finan-
 cial condition today. He is in
 debt double the amount what
 he was when he took posses-
 sion of the land, and one item is
 for \$500 interest at 10 per cent,
 which he gave his note for. He
 is owing the grocery, hard-
 ware and department stores
 sums of money they will never
 be able to collect, unless they
 are secured. We simply men-
 tion this to prove that the sys-
 tem of selling high priced land
 with the object of making a
 commission or beating some
 poor devil out of a few hundred
 dollars, looks to us like impos-
 ing on those who are lead into
 that kind of a trap. The busi-
 ness men suffer in giving credit
 in cases like this, for it is safe
 to say that they have contribut-
 ed many hundred dollars to the
 improvement of the high priced
 farm.

Economy seems to be the
 slogan just now in State affairs.
 Elect a conservative, conscien-
 cious man like Dr. Withycombe
 governor and this will im-
 mediately follow. To illustrate
 this more fully, if you wanted
 a person to run you business or
 farm, would you employ a poli-
 tician or a person who had made
 a success in business? One of
 the troubles with Oregon is that
 the people elect politicians to
 office and then wonder why the
 State tax keeps piling up. We
 are glad that the people are
 aroused to the situation and see
 the mistake they made in elect-
 ing politicians to conduct State
 affairs. Other men may have
 done more for the State than
 Dr. Withycombe, but no one
 has done more to build up and
 develop the agricultural resour-
 ces of the State along modern
 lines. As Oregon is an ideal
 agricultural State, it seems to
 us that it would be good busi-
 ness sense to place a practical,
 experienced, business man like
 Dr. Withycombe at the head of
 this State, who knows how to
 make this a great agricultural
 State, which the average poli-
 tician and office seeker knows
 little about. We have only the
 highest respect for the other
 candidates who aspire to become
 governor, but at present prefer
 Dr. Withycombe for the reasons
 set forth above.

The issues are squarely drawn
 between the Headlight and the
 Herald. Bro. Trombley regis-
 tered as a Democrat and is now
 affiliated with the party that
 placed the dairymen's, the lum-
 bermen's and the fishermen's
 industries on the free list and in

competition with cheap labor of
 foreign countries. The snap
 shot man is registered as a Re-
 publican and affiliated with a
 party that is opposed to free
 trade and opposed to the home
 markets being glutted with
 foreign produce and manufact-
 ured articles. Shake, Bro.
 Trombley, before the fight be-
 gins, for in throwing down the
 gauntlet we contend that the
 free trade policy of the Demo-
 cratic party is an injustice and
 an injury to the dairying, fish-
 ing and lumbering industries of
 Tillamook County, and for that
 reason we intend to fight for the
 interest of our home industries,
 for their protection and finan-
 cial advancement, which means
 much for the future develop-
 ment and prosperity of Tilla-
 mook County. Put your fight-
 ing duds on, Bro. Trombley, for
 we intend to wage a vigorous
 and persistent fight from now
 on. We believe we are right and
 intend to convince the people of
 this county that free trade is a
 detriment, and will retard the
 growth and future development
 of the county, and in doing so
 we expect to land some heavy
 blows on Bro. Trombley's optics.

The snap shot man is going
 to make a suggestion in regard
 to the controversy regarding the
 Sandlake, Bayocean and Ne-
 halem-Wheeler roads, with a
 view of having these roads con-
 structed as soon as possible. If
 anyone can offer a better plan
 we are ready to coincide with
 it. If not, then "get together"
 on the plan we suggest. We
 suggest that it be submitted to
 a vote of the people that the
 County Court be empowered to
 issue warrants to the amount of
 \$100,000, one third of which to
 go to each road, to be refunded
 the next three years, each road
 district paying \$11,111 annually
 out of the amount appropriated
 for the district. The advantage
 of this plan is: It will open up
 these roads at once and the peo-
 ple and the property owners
 will have the benefit of them;
 it will not interfere with road
 improvements in other sections
 and will not increase taxation.
 This, in our judgment, is the
 best plan to bring about these
 improvements and do justice to
 those who patiently waited for
 good roads, while other sections
 were having all the road funds
 expended on road improve-
 ments. If this is not agree-
 able and the people are not in
 favor of our suggestion, then
 the County Court should appro-
 priate \$10,000 annually to each
 of these roads. It is time to
 quit wrangling about the build-
 ing and improvement of these
 roads, and "get together" on
 the plans we have outlined as
 a solution to the problem. We
 are inclined to believe that the
 people of the north end of the
 county are nearer together on
 the building of the Wheeler-Ne-
 halem road than some persons
 think, for there is an impres-
 sion that by using money on the
 road this year it would stop road
 improvements in other parts of
 the district, which, it must be
 admitted, it would do. Our
 suggestion not only provides
 for the construction of these
 roads, but offers a plan for the
 people of the first road district
 to "get together" and help
 boost with other parts of the
 county what the snap shot man
 recommends, who is a booster
 for good roads in all parts of
 the county, especially where
 there is business activity and a
 disposition to promote public
 enterprise.

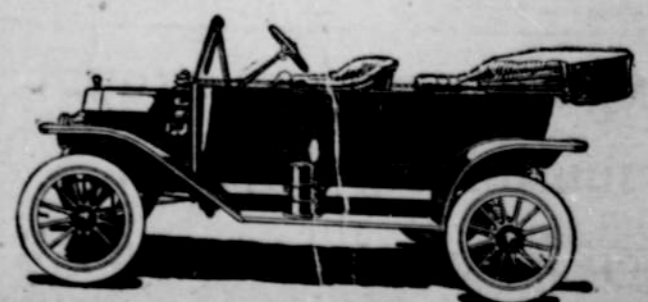
