With high production prices have gradually come down until wholesale prices in this city are now about 15 cents per pound. REGISTRATION CLOSED.

The registration which closed on Friday shows that 1651 men and 698 women registered in Tillamook County to participate in the primary nominating election that takes place on Friday, May 15. The Prohibitionists have increased their voting strength by the aid of 105 women voters, the latter out-registering the men two to one. The Progressive-Bull Moose party—is a fizzle in this county, only 29 having the sand to stand by the mushroom party. The Socialists have lost in numbers in this county, and with 20 women registering as Socialists, the entire registration fell below 100. Those who call themselves independent or who refused to designate with, numbered 123. Republicans in Tillamook County out-number all other parties, having a registration of
