ABOUT HALIBUT BANKS.

Writing to J. O. Bozorth, of Bay City, in regard to the cod and hali-but banks, Congressman Hawley says: "With further reference to your letter of April 21, I beg to say that investigation at the Bureau of Fisheries develops the fact and confirms my understanding also, that it is the present intention of the Bureau Fisheries to extend their surveys of cod and halibut banks all along the Oregon coast to include the Tillamook Bay region as well as the re-gion around the Yaquina Bay. The Commissioner of Fisheries advises me that the Bureau of Fisheries at-taches considerable importance to this

work and I am glad to know that they are so much interested in the matter for I have been urging just such a survey for about two years, when the matter was first called to my atten-tion. The object of the survey is to tion. The object of the survey is to determine the aquatic resources of these banks and to point out the pos-sibility for establishing profitable fisheries thereon, and I hope this may result as it would mean such to our people."
