

THE PRIMARY IN TILLAMOOK

Political Parties Nominate Their Tickets.

The primary election in Tillamook passed off quietly on Friday, with little or no friction between the different aspirants for office. Considerable interest was taken in the state ticket of the Republican and Democratic parties on account of the large number of aspirants. Amongst local candidates there was a lively contest for county commissioners, county surveyor and sheriff on the Republican ticket. Frank L. Owens won out on the four-year term and F. L. Sappington on the two-year term, who was only 19 votes ahead of D. F. Thompson. Sappington had an overwhelming vote in three of the precincts of the North, Wheeler, Nehalem and Rockaway giving him 178 votes to 40 cast for Thompson. H. Crenshaw was an easy winner over Emmett Bales for sheriff. For county surveyor R. L. Shreve surprised himself and his friends by the manner in which he outdistanced his competitors. A. M. Hare, who is the nominee for county judge, polled more votes than any other candidate in the county, followed closely by J. C. Holden for county clerk.

"CLEAN-UP" DAY.

The unsightly lawn, back yard, street and alley are not in keeping with our paved streets, beautiful homes and fine business buildings. The fact the G. A. R. Encampment is to be held here, makes it specially important that we exert ourselves to have our City as cleanly and attractive as possible. Therefore, I proclaim Thursday, June 11, CLEAN-UP-DAY, and ask all citizens to lay aside their work on that day and give their attention to cleaning and beautifying their surroundings.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

The Common Council met in regular session this date at 8 p. m. when there were present Hon. F. R. Beals, mayor; Councilmen G. A. Edmunds, John Keldson, G. B. Lamb and M. Melchior; Marshal N. J. Myers, City Attorney H. T. Botts, Recorder R. B. Hays; whereupon the following proceedings were had, to-wit: The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The street committee reported favorably on the petition for concrete sidewalk on Second avenue East and the City Attorney was instructed to prepare the necessary documents. In the petition of C. Thayer to cancel a lien on a portion of block 26 Thayers addition to Tillamook City, the same was left to the City Attorney.

The mayor's report on the Maple Grove damages resulting from the conflicting street grades was continued. The ways and means committee report on property lines and adjustment of same was continued and they were further instructed to try to effect an exchange whereby the mill company could procure more ground and could then let the city have the necessary portion of their holdings without cramping their office space. In regard to the general fund moneys the offer of the First National Bank to take one-half of the fund and turn over I. O. O. F. bonds drawing 6 per cent and guaranteeing to redeem them at par on 60 days' demand at the end of one year was ordered accepted if approved by the City Attorney; the offer of the Tillamook County bank to take the remaining portion of the fund and turn over a first mortgage secured by what is known as the Jones property in block 3, Thayers addition to Tillamook City and indorsed by M. W. Harrison, the same to draw 6 per cent and to be redeemed at par by the bank on 60 days' notice at the end of one year, was ordered accepted if approved by the City Attorney.

The health and police committee reported that the garbage dump could be constructed at small expense and they were further ordered to see the Coates Lumber Company and see if a temporary dump could not be obtained at their new yards. The street commissioner was instructed to have a drain dug so as to remove the stagnant water on the west end of Front street and also to order the P. R. & N. to complete their fill on Front street. Upon motion duly made and carried the G. A. R. was granted the concessions asked for provided they would defray the expenses of the special police during the encampment, all concessions to comply with the ordinances of the city. The offer of Howard Brooks to remove the remains of the laundry from Fifth street for the lumber in the same was accepted. The mayor and recorder were instructed to sign, on behalf of the city, a contract for fire service with the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company. The City Attorney was instructed to draft dog license, show license and auto ordinances and present the same at the next meeting.

The report of the street committee on the sanitary sewer and on the opening of Tenth street to Sixth avenue East were ordered continued until the next regular meeting. It is ordered that the hearing of objections and remonstrances to the sewer and pavement assessment be and the same is hereby continued until the next regular meeting June 1, 1914, at 7:30 o'clock p. m. It is further ordered that the time for receiving bids for concrete sidewalk construction be continued until the next regular meeting June 1, at 7:30 o'clock p. m. Upon motion duly made and carried the council adjourned until May 25, 1914, at 7:30 o'clock p. m.

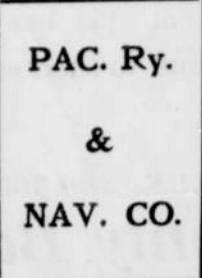
