Water Supply Inadequate for Fire Protection.

We do not want to raise any unnecessary alarm, but it is just as well to take the proper precautions and if the water is being wasted, now is the time to stop it. The city must have proper fire protection and the hose company must have water and plenty of pressure to successfully fight fire. This is a matter that every business man and property owner should be interested in at this time.

City Council Meeting.

The City Attorney was instructed to write Gibish & Joplin in regard to the replacing of gravel on Third and Fifth streets.

The Street Committee reported that Severance would allow garbage dumped on his place as soon as the hay was cut.

The Marshal's reports for April, May and June were read and placed on file.

Recommendation of old council that G. L. Dick be allowed \$11.20 for gravel on 12th street was read, and on motion duly made and carried the Recorder was ordered to draw a warrant on the General Fund for the said amount.

The City Attorney was instructed to write to different saw-mill towns and find the methods to abate the fire risks and cinder nuisances.

A Clean-up Ordinance was ordered

drafted to enable the City to cause property owners to pay for cleaning their premises and for cutting the grass in the streets in front of their property.

An ordinance regulating the driving and operating of motorcycles, automobiles, or other motor driven vehicles, upon the side walks and streets, and declaring an emergency, was read and duly passed.

A resolution was passed to improve a number of streets, and Monday, July 20th, was the date set for hearing objections.

Upon motion duly made and carried the Small and Urie franchise ordinance was read for the third time and duly passed.

Upon motion duly made and carried a number of bills were allowed.

It was ordered that the hearing of objections and remonstrances to the sewer and pavement assessment be continued until next regular meeting.

It was further ordered that the time for receiving bids for concrete sidewalk construction be continued until the next regular meeting.
