The Artisans and Kiddies will go too, and all the people of the county are invited to go and take their dinners and spend the day, an excellent dinner will be served there for all who desire, at the Hotel.

COMMERCIAL CLUB JOTTINGS.

Over 400 pieces of advertising matter were mailed this week by Secretary Worrall, descriptive of Tillamook county and city, and telling of our vast virgin opportunities to citizens of other states, mailing lists are being supplied by the Great Railroad interests, the Oregon Development League, Sunset Magazine and from other sources of citizens who actually write inquiring of Oregon, with a view of coming here. Secretary Worrall expressed 500 booklets to the immigration Dept. of G. N. R. R. at their request. The Secretary of the Oregon Development League at Portland writes as follows: "Send me more printed literature descriptive of Tillamook County. The ever increasing demand for information of your wonderful county has exhausted our supply. I am glad to see your club taking on new life. Keep up the good work."

Many of our citizens who were in arrears for dues, are paying up and realize their help is needed to encourage the club officers, who are now doing something for the city and county.

All those in arrears for dues \$3.00 will positively have their names posted on club doors on Saturday August 1st. Better see the Secretary at once and keep your name off this list.

Arrangements are being perfected by President Dwight to call an open club meeting soon to discuss equalizing assessments and taxes. He is now busy searching the records in the court house for information and some surprises are in store. Tillamook Work Provided For

Major Morrow, in his annual report of harbor improvements in Tillamook county says:

On Tillamook Bay and bar dredging was carried on between Bay City and Tillamook until August 18, 1913, and 17,000 cubic yards taken out, so a channel nine feet deep was opened through Long Jetty Shoal. After August the dredge was operated by the Port of Tillamook. May 10, 1914, the dredge was sent to Nehalem River to operate in the channel between Wheeler and Nehalem.

On the Tillamook bar project Giebish & Joplin have a contract and have attended to the preliminary work. It is expected the jetty will be constructed more than half by the end of the next fiscal year. Navigation has been carried on by 102 vessels, carrying 15 passengers and 9185 tons of cargo, valued at \$1,035,500.

On the Nehalem bar the extension of the south jetty seaward was under way in May. At the end of the fiscal year the tramway was out 221 ft., and 5763 tons of rock had been dumped.

Reports on commerce there show that 60 vessels handled 4457 tons, valued at \$67,311.

Port Commissioner Goes to Washington.

F. A. Rowe, Commissioner for the Port of Nehalem, left for Washington D. C. Monday morning to appear before the Board of Army Engineers in an effort to secure needed appropriations for this harbor.

The bills introduced by Senators Lane and Chamberlain have been turned down by the Army Engineers and unless some more pressure is brought to bear upon the matter in order to secure another hearing there is no assurance of getting an appropriation for inner harbor work.

Two years ago Commissioner C. H. Wheeler was sent to Washington also to get government aid in building the Nehalem jetty and, through the efforts of ex-Senator Bourne, the project was favorably acted upon by the Board of Army Engineers and passed in the senate by amendment to the river and harbor bill.

It is believed that Mr. Rowe will so succeed in getting results so that the inner harbor improvement work may be carried out as approved by the local engineers in Portland.

Mr. Rowe expects to be gone about three weeks.—Nehalem Valley Reporter.

State Press Flashlights.

The appropriation of \$20,000 asked for by the Forest Grove Commercial club for additional study and research relative to the insect, of midge, which is said to be threatening the clover industry, is timely but Federal experts come rather high. Why not refer the matter to the State Agricultural College? That is one of the purposes for which the taxpayers are maintaining that institution. If they cannot find a remedy, being acquainted as they are with the soil of this section of the valley, how will the Federal experts sent from the East or those working in Washington D. C. laboratories reach any beneficial conclusions?—News Reporter.

There is no early question of the absolute logic of putting the ports on the Washington coast of the Columbia river in the Oregon district; that's where they belong, geographically, topographically, economically, as a dispatching business proposition; and the crowning logic of the issue lies in making Astoria the first and last port of entry for United States Customs within the Columbian territory. This is to be demonstrated someday when the real shipping interests of the river have been safely and sensibly adjusted and standardized. Nor will it minimize the prestige of Portland an iota either!—Astorian.
