

TILLAMOOK SHOWS HOSPITALITY TO VISITORS.

Artisans' Clam Bake Club Given Rousing Reception.

The special train of six coaches from Portland, arrived Saturday at 2 p.m. and it bore some 250 Artisans, with ladies, 75 poor "Kiddies", with some mothers and lady representatives from the Associated Charities of Portland, in charge, also the celebrated Ladies' Oak Grove, brass band composed, not only of good musicians, but ladies of beauty and culture, the Rose City Orchestra of four pieces, and a number of other musicians and entertainers. The train was met at Bar View by a committee from the local Artisan Assembly, headed by Attorney Geo. P. Winslow and Mesdames Snodgrass, Myers, Monk and Holland, and with Fred C. Baker and Secretary C. R. Worrall, representing the Commercial Club, Mr. Baker presenting Supreme Master Artisan with the great key to Tillamook in well chosen remarks. Mr. Winslow presented our hospitalities to the Ladies' Band.

On arrival at the depot about 500 citizens with automobiles received them with music by the G. A. R. drum band. The local reception committee soon had everybody at the Tillamook Hotel, the headquarters. Capt Reynolds marched the happy Kiddies through town, and everyone received them with cheers. With genuine well known hospitality Tillamook citizens threw open their homes and every guest was made to feel at home. Mr. J. H. Dunstan Master of Fairview Grange, took charge of the "Kiddies", and soon they were in autos going to the hospitable homes of the people for a two weeks outing. They will be taken to Bar View Friday for a picnic and day in the surf, and play in the sands of Grand Old Pacific Ocean, in charge of Mr. and Mrs. Dunstan and others, and will be returned to Portland next week after the happiest two weeks of their lives.

Committee from the home band invited the Ladies' visiting band to join them in a concert on Saturday evening.

At six o'clock a bounteous supper was served to some 500 in the skating rink by the local Artisan Assembly, which received many compliments and was highly appreciated. At 8 p.m., the two bands gave a street concert, the streets were roped off and a dance and carnival was held for an hour. At 9 p.m. the Ladies' Band headed the procession and all went to the Commercial Club rooms, where a grand reception, musical and ball was tendered the guests, which was the social event of the summer season, with the ladies displaying many beautiful gowns. It was, indeed, a happy, care-free crowd. All were met at the doors by the Club's reception committee, assisted by Tillamook's finest ladies; our efficient secretary, C. R. Worrall was master of ceremonies which means that every detail was carried out to perfection; owing to the unavoidable absence of Mayor F. R. Beals, Mr. Worrall formally welcomed the guests in his usual able manner and his happy introductions of the entertainers on the program elicited many compliments from all.

And the night was filled with music and the cares that infested the day folded their tents like the Arabs and silently stole away.
The early hours of dawn had arrived when "Home, Sweet, Home," vibrated in each heart, and all wended their homeward way.

Sunday morning all went to Bar View as guests of the Push Club, and Mine Host Oliver, of the Hotel. It was a perfect day, the beach, bathing in the surf, a great free clam bake for all, a program of music and speeches, picnic dinners, dancing, crabs, clams and chowder galore, and the citizens of Bar View did themselves proud as usual in entertaining their guests.

At 6 p.m. the Clam Bake Club and guests entrained for Portland with three cheers for Tillamook County Beaches and hospitality and a promise to come again next year.

Investigating Halibut Beds.

A few years ago when making his annual trip over the First Congressional District, Representative W. C. Hawley was advised by people living along the Oregon coast in the vicinity of Tillamook and Yaquina bays that there were many evidences of existing halibut banks in that locality. Foreseeing a profitable industry for his constituents should it be found that halibut abound in large numbers in the waters adjacent to the counties of Lincoln and Tillamook, Mr. Hawley took the matter up with the Commissioner of Fisheries and asked that a careful survey of the locality be made. This was decided upon by the Government and the following letter will furnish further information to those interested in the progress of the work:

Bureau of Fisheries, Washington, August 6, 1914.
Hon. Willis C. Hawley,
House of Representatives.

My dear Sir: In reply of your letter of inquiry of the 5th instant regarding the further work of the Albatross on the coast of Oregon, I beg to advise that the Albatross was temporarily withdrawn from that investigation in order to go to Alaska and will resume the work during the present month. In the meantime, the investigation has not been dropped, but has been conducted out of Newport by means of shore parties in charge of the technical assistants attached to the Albatross. As soon as the results of this work are in suitable shape, I shall take pleasure in communicating them to you. The Bureau is in hope that local fisheries of considerable importance may be developed as the result of our investigations.
