The city council recently passed a curfew ordinance, which will go into effect on September 1st, when it will be unlawful for minors to be on the street after eight o'clock at night, unless accompanied by their parents or

It seems that the ordinance does not specify the age other than minors, and in that case young men below the age of 21 years as well as young men below the age of 18 years, will have to comply with the curfew ordinance.
