SUED FOR ROAD TOLLS.

The Plaintiffs Claim \$1,264.80 From Mail Carrier.

A case has been filed in the circuit court by John W. Boyer and M. O. Boyer, who leased what is known as the "Salmon River Road" from the county, against J. M. Burton, the mail carrier, and the plaintiffs claim \$421.-60 for legal toll, and refusing to pay this amount they claim \$1,246,-80, three times the amount of the tolls. On the 25th of January, 1909 the county court leased to the plaintiffs this toll road, for a period of ten years, with the usual conditions of keeping the road in good traveling easily. condition for teams and wagons at all seasons of the year, to clear the road of all standing brush and timber to a width of 12 feet, and to keep a track for hauling of a width of eight feet, and to establish turn-outs at no greater distance than twenty rods apart, and to bridge or ferry all streams and grade of road not to exceed 12 per cent, and to lay planking or puncheon in all spungy or swampy places. The plaintiffs were to pay the county one dollar a year for this lease and in consideration of the agreement was per-

mitted to charge certain tolls. Plaintiff claims that during the times mentioned, the defendant was engaged in carrying the U. S. mail over a route which compelled him to travel over and upon the aforesaid road and to pass through the toll gate thereon, with horses and vehicles the amount of which ran up to \$421.60 which the defendant refused to pay.


