### CIRCUIT COURT IN SESSION.

Circuit Judge Webster Holmes convened the circuit court on Tuesday. The docket is light compared to other years.

The Grand Jury Brought in the Following Indictments.

Howard Edmunds and Lloyd Williams, charged with dynamiting fish in the Trask river. Williams pleaded guilty and was fined \$300.00, which he paid. Edmunds pleaded not guilty and his trial was set for today. When the case was called and a jury selected, Attorneys Johnson and Handley attacked the indictment as drawn up by District Attorney Gersoni, and the Judge sustaining the motion threw the case out of court.

Ray Cooper, charged with murder in the second degree. This is the case where Cooper shot a German homesheader at Blaine in a shooting scrape at Blaine. He pleaded not guilty and the case is set for trial next Monday.

C. E. McAlpin was charged with lewd cohabitation with Mrs. Mary Ellis Dickens, the young woman who lived with McAlpin and whose death from poison has caused some mystery. He pleaded guilty and Judge Holmes fined him \$50.00, which he paid. While McAlpin was seated in the court house after he was fined, he lost consciousness and fell to the floor and it took several minutes to revive him.

Herman Schollmeyer was indicted for setting out fires. Schollmeyer pleaded not guilty.

Judge Holmes excused the grand jury on Tuesday afternoon.

In the case of the State vs. Oscar Schultz, an assault case appealed from the justice court, in which Turney was the complainant, District Attorney Gersoni, having failed to prove a case, defendant was acquitted.

B. S. Pague, vs. John Nicklaus, et al. Action for money. Plaintiff took voluntary non suit.

Tillamook County Bank, vs. Ivan Parson, Action for money. Plaintiff took non suit.

John Theiler, vs. Tillamook County Damages. This case was tried on Wednesday before a jury Theiler is claiming \$1,000 damages as a result of the county placing a culvert across the road at his farm. On motion of District Attorney Gersoni, the Judge instructed the jury to bring in a verdict in favor of the county. Attorney Johnson gave notice of appeal to the supreme court.

Nehalem Valley Bank, vs. M. J. Gersoni. Action for money. Default and judgment.

Robert Watt, vs. F. H. Wilkins, et al. Foreclosure on contract agreement. Default and decree for Plaintiff.

Oglesby Young, vs. Isabella Collins, et al. Foreclosure of mortgage.

Default taken against all defendants who have not appeared and decree of foreclosure.

William Ryan, vs. Richard F. Ryan et al, To Quit title. Default and decree for plaintiff.

A. N. Marolf, vs. Preston Marolf, Partition. Leave to amend complaint allowed.

Iva M. Miller, vs. Ivan D. Miller, Divorce, Default and decree for plaintiff.

Evidently encouraged by Judge Webster Holmes' ruling against the Polk County court, suit will be instituted soon in Marion County to compel County Judge Bushey to heed the provisions of the widow's pension law. Bushey has persisted in refusing to grant pensions, declaring that the law left it to his discretion. He also gave a reason for his refusal that many women who were well able to take care of themselves and children had sought to take advantage of the pension offer.—Polk County Observer.
