Mr. and Mrs. Moore left on Tuesday morning for McMinnville where Mr. Moore will teach in the High School.

Reception at Commercial Club.

The Tillamook Commercial Club gave a reception on Thursday evening in honor of the visit of Dr. Withycombe to the city, who is a candidate for governor on the Republican ticket. In the absence of President Dwight, Fred C. Baker was called upon to preside, who introduced the distinguished visitor.

Dr. Withycombe first referred to the splendid exhibits he had seen at the fair, which was a surprise to him, but he was greatly pleased to see the great improvement that had been made in stock since he first visited Tillamook. Dr. Withycombe referred to what Holland and Denmark had had done in dairying and the progress made by better stock and scientific dairymen. He referred to the increased products raised in Oregon in recent years, but he said, this was comparatively small to what could be raised had we more people and cheaper money to develop the agricultural resources of the state. The Dr. deeply regretted the European war, for he was of the opinion that it would in some respects be a set back to Oregon, for many of the young men killed in battle would, no doubt, have come to this state, which was needing more settlers to help develop the agricultural resources. He paid a high tribute to the Germans and those of other nationalities who had cleaned up land.

Attorney J. A. Jeffreys, candidate for Attorney General on the Demo-

cratic ticket, also made a few remarks after which both candidates were introduced to those present.

Ray Cooper on Trial.

General local interest has been held during the past week in the case of State of Oregon vs. Ray Cooper, which has been on trial for the past four days in the Circuit Court. The State of Oregon being represented by M. J. Gersoni, District Attorney, and by C. T. Haas, of the Law firm of Woernle & Haas, Portland, Ore., while the defense is represented by H. T. Botts, a local attorney, and Attorney John A. Jeffrey of Portland, Ore. The crime on which the defendant is now on trial is for the alleged murder of Michael Ecker in a shooting scrape near the latter's homestead at Blaine, Ore. It is claimed that defendant killed Michael Ecker on July 31st, 1914, by shooting him with a rifle. Ray Cooper while admitting the killing claims it was done in self defense.

Ray Cooper was formerly a teacher of manual training in the Tillamook High School, and from all reports had a good reputation and was well thought of by local people prior to the shooting.

The jury in this case was empanelled on Monday, all day being taken for this purpose, the members of the jury being as follows:—J. J. Powell, C. W. Clements, Alex Finlanon, B. Tomlinson, Carl C. Hunt, Henry Rogers, J. G. Kennedy, Len Hiner, Alfred Magnuson, Dan H. Fletcher and Frank Crane.

On Tuesday the State started the presentation of the case introducing as witnesses Mrs. Kate Allison and Ben and Don Allison of Blaine, all eye witnesses to the actual shooting. Other witnesses on behalf of the State were Dr. Monk, who identified photographs taken by him on the scene of the alleged murder, Dr. Hawk, the coroner of the county, J. S. Wilmont, store keeper of Blaine, Mr. Browning, Mrs. Anna Dahl of Blaine, Carl Linke of Portland, Ore., and Mrs. Mina Ecker, widow of the deceased.

On behalf of the defense Lee and Don Cooper, brothers of the accused were introduced as witnesses. Mrs. M. Cooper, mother of the defendant and Sheriff H. Crenshaw were also witnesses for the defense.

Owing to the importance of the case and the local interest therein, the court room in which it was being tried was constantly crowded to its full capacity. And because of the defendants many friends in Tillamook it is doubtful whether a conviction can be secured. Closing arguments in the case were made Friday, and after the Judges instructions were given, the case was given to the jury, who up to the time of going to press had not yet returned a verdict.

The case went to the jury at three o'clock on Friday afternoon.

Timbermen Make Explanation.
