Wanted somebody to take charge
of the Tillamook school exhibit at
the next state fair. Here is where this
county fell down.

Prohibition candidates are equally
as bad as Democratic candidates in
mud slinging and dirty methods. It
will not avail them anything any-
way.

Those who vote for Bill Handley
and W. S. U'Ren will be throwing
their votes away for neither of these
gentlemen will cut any figure in the
election.

It is no surprise to us to find that
voters, who are striving to make the
state "dry" supporting "wet" candi-
dates in other parties. Any old
thing to fool the voters.

Senator Chamberlain is ashamed of
the Democratic party, for his show
cards failed to state which party he

believes that more foolish, impractical
laws should be passed.

The Democratic party after placing

of Oregon for the purpose of procur-
ing their votes. Wouldn't that jar you
And they are doing the same thing
with the "wets" and "drys". But the
farmers, the "wets" and the "drys",
have caught on to the scheme and
can't be humbugged in that manner
again.

Mark Holmes, a Democrat war
horse, is one of the many Democrats
who have deserted George Chamberlain.
And we are given to understand
that there are Democrats in Tilla-
mook who have had enough of Cham-
berlain's free trade, non-partisan
spectacular performances, and we are
somewhat surprised to find so many
Democrats fighting Chamberlain and
the Smith-West-Chamberlain political
boss combination.

This is the issue at the coming
election: If you believe in free trade
for everything produced in Tillamook
county—then you should vote for
George Chamberlain to succeed him-
self, C. J. Smith for governor and
Fred Hollister for Congressman. On
the other hand, if you believe in pro-
tection for home products, then you
should vote for R. A. Booth for United
States Senator, Dr. Withycombe
for Governor and W. C. Hawley for
congressman. This is what these
gentlemen stand for.

The Grand jury will indict District
Attorney M. J. Gersoni, charged with
incompetency, failure to attend to his
duties and gambling. This will give
Gersoni a day in court where both
sides will have to defend their posi-
tions. It is premature for us to dis-
cuss this matter at the present time,
for we do not want to prejudice the
case on either side. We have contend-
ed that the District Attorney is en-
titled to a day in court, and we are
glad that it is to be decided in that
manner. We may say that it is the
grand jury that is responsible for the
investigation and the indictment.

Senator Chamberlain made a speech
in the senate against free wool and
predicted that it would ruin the wool
industry of the west, but when the
Democratic party's whip snapped he
not only voted for free wool, but free
milk, free cream, free fish, free lum-
ber, free eggs, free meat, etc. This
places wool growers, dairymen, fish-
ermen, lumbermen, meat raisers, etc.,
in a position where they have to com-
pete with the cheap labor of foreign
countries and the Orient. If you
want more free trade, vote for the
Democratic party, but if you are tired
of this free trade bunco game in
politics, then the way to deal it a
death blow is to vote for Republican
candidates. It is a square, cut and
dried issue for the voters to decide
which they want—free trade or pro-
tection.

B. J. Jones sought the nomination
of congressman on the Republican
ticket at the primary election. After a
fair contest he was beaten and W. C.
Hawley nominated. Mr. Jones is now
opposing A. R. Booth, who also won
in a free, open primary election on
the Republican ticket. It was the
sovereign will of the people that
nominated Mr. Booth and defeated
Mr. Jones. Those who will not abide
by the vote of the people in a fair
primary election, shows they are
prompted, not to assist the party
they affiliated with, but for their own
personal selfish purpose. Mr. Jones
is in the disgruntled political class,
the same class that brought defeat to

the Republican party because they
failed to obtain office. Had Mr. Jones
received the nomination for congress-
man on the Republican ticket he
would not be supporting a free trader
for Senator.

There is a difference of opinion as
to the result of state wide prohibition
in Oregon, which is to be voted on
next month. Quite a number of
counties will give the prohibition
cause large majorities, but to off-set
this, Portland will cast a large vote
against state wide prohibition, and
for that reason we expect to see
Oregon remain on the "wet" water
wagon. There is one phase, however,
of state wide prohibition this is over-
looked that is going to cut some
figure in the election, numbers of
citizens who voted for local option
will not vote for state wide prohibi-
tion and to prohibit the shipment in-
to dry territory.

State wide prohibition will not
amount to anything unless liquor is
also prohibited from being imported
into the state. And it is on this one
phase of the question where some
persons think that the prohibition
party is encroaching upon their liber-
ties. It is a debatable question and
if the voters can legislate on what a
person shall or shall not drink why
not make a crusade on the vote
against many of the injurious food
stuffs that are consumed, and the
gluttony of voters in over eating?
From our observation the person who
over drinks is in the same class as
those who over eat and gorge them-
selves, with food stuffs.

So-called reformers in Lane county
have started out to make that county
"wet" again, although they would be
horrified to think they were the
cause of such a movement. Last Sun-
day the District Attorney put the
"lid" on ice cream parlors, candy fruit
and cigar stores, in fact, every store
but the butcher and the baker who
are privileged characters in Oregon
to do business on Sundays according
to an antiquated law just resurrected.
They haven't arrived at Puritanical
perfection over in Lane county, where
you can't get a meal on Sundays, but
if it is a crime to sell ice cream, fruit
and candies on Sundays to the little
tots, why isn't it equally a crime to
employ cooks and waiters in restau-
rants and hotels and servants in pri-
vate families, street and railroad car
drivers and conductors, girls in tele-
phone offices, police men, firemen,
preachers and the organ players and
vocalists who are paid for their ser-
vices, business men who go to their
offices on Sundays and do a large
amount of work, liverymen and those
who have autos to hire, the daily
newspapers and the news boys, Uncle
Sam for handling mail, the farmer for
pumping his cows, etc.? We don't be-
lieve in making fish of one and fowl
of others, for it is one of Governor
West appointees who is discriminat-
ing against children obtaining can-
dies, ice cream and fruit on Sundays,
while the grown folks employed in
the numerous avocations we have
above mentioned are not molested.
Such a farce is laughable, and we are
inclined to believe that these so-called
reformers in Lane County have
sprouted wings and are too good to
live in this world much longer.

Tillamook County did not get a
square deal at the State Fair in the
cheese exhibits. The State Fair
Board, however, should not be blam-
ed for this. But it won't happen again
for the "live wires" from Tillamook
were on the war path when they
found out that the Superintendent of
the Dairy Department had discrimi-
nated against Tillamook cheese be-
longing to the Tillamook County
Creamery Association. A. H. Lea,
purchasing agent of the Union Meat
Co., had charge of the dairy depart-
ment, and he would not allow cheese
from the association in the dairy
building. Most of our readers have a
poor opinion of Mr. Lea, anyway for
he did everything he possibly could to
"knock" the price of Tillamook
cheese. He took another whack at
Tillamook cheese and showed his
spleen when he, with Spaniard like
motive, gave the Tillamook County
Creamery Association a stab in the
back. It came about in this manner:
Mr. Lea filled the small dairy build-
ing with cheese, composed of cheese
from outside of the state and from
one factory in this county, and a few
other factories in the state. As we
have already stated, Mr. Lea would
not allow the cheese of the associa-
tion to be placed in this building, and
with a man with that kind of a pull
and authority, it is not surprising that
he won the first prize. We said
"won the first prize," well, wouldn't
it be more correct to say that he
"pulled the first prize" for he man-
ipulated the entries in the dairy build-
ing and crowded out the Tillamook
County Creamery Association. The
cheese of the association was placed
in the new pavilion, and after the
judges had inspected the cheese ex-
hibited in the dairy building, he pro-
tested against the judges inspecting
the exhibit of cheese belonging to the

association. Another thing, in the
scoring contest, the same cheese that
scored 96 points at Sacramento and
Tillamook, fell five points below at
Salem. It is well to explain here that
Mr. Lea obtained possession of the
scoring cards before they were turned
over to the secretary. This is charac-
teristic of a big trust like the Union
Meat Co., and Mr. Lea is the dirty
little nigger in the wood pile who is
doing the bidding of the trust com-
pany in "knocking" the Tillamook
County Creamery Association. As a
result of Mr. Lea's unfairness, we can
assure the citizens of Tillamook
county that this will be the last time
that he will have charge of the dairy
departments at the State Fair, a po-
sition which he obtained, no doubt,
to "rub it in to Tillamook." The dirty
little nigger is too small a little nig-
ger to have anything to do in the
future with the State Fair. All Tilla-
mook County wanted was a "square
deal" which was impossible to obtain
with Mr. Lea connected with the
dairy department. In all fairness to
the management of the State Fair, we
may state that it was not aware of
what was being done, in regard to the
cheese display, but in every other
respect Tillamook County was well
treated and will make a better display
next year. But not if Mr. Lea has
anything to do with the State Fair.

Oregon Farmers Move Frequently.

In compiling data for the last Fed-
eral Census, the enumerators asked
every farmer in Oregon this question
"How long have you lived on the
farm you now occupy?" This ques-
tion was answered by 42,064 of the
45,502 farm operators in the state.
More than 12,000 stated that they
had occupied their farms only one
year or less; 10,563 from 2 to 4 years;
8,407 from 5 to 9 years and 11,001 10
years and over. The most restless
class of people in the state is the
tenant who operates his farm on the
share basis. There are 3,127 of these
farmers in this state; 3,047 of them
made answer to the query and their
replies indicated that 1,559, or about
20 per cent of them moved every
year.

An official of the Federal Census
Bureau, in discussing the report re-
cently issued by the government,
dealing with the term of occupancy
of farms in the United States said:
"This frequency of moving from
farm to farm or instability of occupa-
ncy, very likely forms one of the chief
causes for the decline of rural pros-
perity, or is a hindrance to greater
progress. Frequency of removal of
farmers results in general shiftless-
ness; the roads and bridges are gen-
erally in a poor condition because the
farmers, moving at frequent periods,
are not particularly interested in their
upkeep. Farm buildings of such farms
are not usually kept in good repair,
as the farmer who is about to move
will leave the repairs for the next
tenant to make. The same reason
will apply for the lack of interest by
the "unstable" farmer in the schools,
churches and general welfare of the
community. They move frequently;
they do not remain on a farm long
enough to get the best results from it,
consequently they are usually in a
poor financial condition."

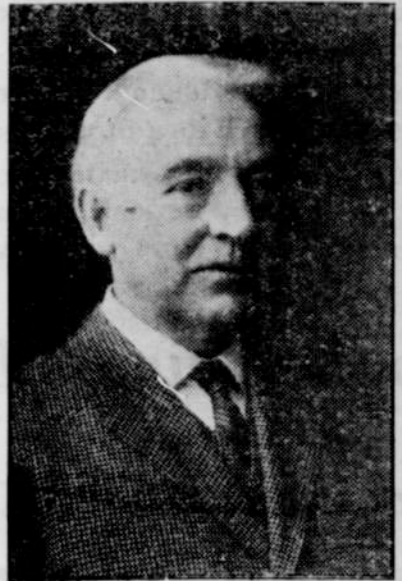
