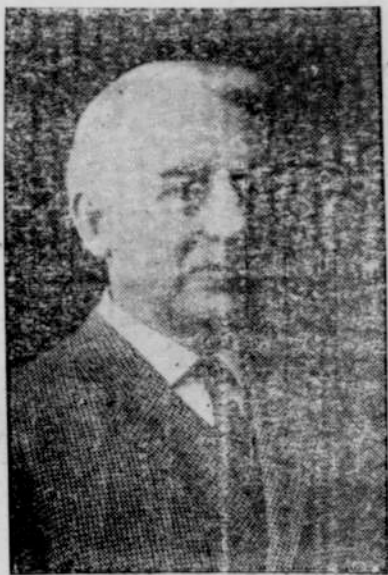


# Why You Should Vote for BOOTH, Republican Candidate for United States Senator.

## CHINESE EGGS COME. Foreign Goods Force Price of Oregon Produce Down.

As a direct result of the imposition of the Democratic tariff, Chinese eggs now are selling in Portland at 20 cents a dozen in direct competition with the product of Oregon farms and ranches.

The importation of New Zealand and Australian butter has forced down the price of Oregon butter to 30 cents a pound.

Immense shipments of Chinese eggs are coming into Portland with every steamship from the orient. As they can be bought in China for a few cents a dozen, they are selling here at only a little more than the actual cost of bringing them into this country, plus their handling.

One "5 and 10-cent" store has been selling these Chinese eggs for 20 cents a dozen. It is admitted that there is no profit in these eggs at this figure, but they serve as a "leader" and attract hundreds of buyers daily. Last Saturday this store disposed of 45 cases of such eggs. There are 20 dozen eggs in a case—a total of 1350 dozen in a day.

At least three or four cases are disposed of daily at this store alone. At several of the public markets in Portland other large quantities are sold every day.

It is predicted that the price will go even lower. It certainly will if the shippers can arrange to pack them cheaper and get lower freight rates on them. On account of the heavy shipments that now are coming into this country, it is understood that a reduction in freight rates on the trans-Pacific vessels will permit Chinese eggs to be sold in Portland as low as 15 or 16 cents a dozen.

The one condition that serves tremendously to make Chinese eggs so cheap is the fact that as a rule the Chinese people themselves don't eat eggs. They grow poultry for the meat but regard the eggs as a by-product. If they cannot sell them to foreign consumers they allow them to go to waste. It seems that they regard eggs with some kind of superstition.

So it is possible to buy these eggs in China at about 3 cents a dozen. They are brought to America in cold storage.

Eggs gathered in China in June now are being sold in Portland, it is said. Some of the stores that sell them don't deny that they are Chinese eggs and offer them in direct competition with Oregon eggs.—Oregonian.

To Gus Mahne and Marie Mahne, the above named defendants: You, and each of you, are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit and court, on or before the last day of the time prescribed in the order for the publication of summons herein which said order was made and dated September 8th, 1914, and if you fail to so answer, for want thereof, the plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief prayed for in said complaint on file herein, to-wit: for judgment against said defendants and each of them for the sum of \$200.00 together with interest thereon at the rate of 8 per cent per annum from the 4th day of October, 1906 until paid and for the further sum of \$75.00 attorney's fees herein, and for the costs and disbursements of this suit; that a certain mortgage mentioned in said complaint, for \$200.00 given by said defendants to plaintiff be foreclosed and that the property covered by said mortgage, to-wit: the NE quarter of section nine Township three North of Range six west of the Willamette meridian, in Tillamook County, Oregon, be sold in the manner provided by law and the proceeds of such sale be applied to the payment of said judgment, and that all persons claiming by through or under said defendants or either of them subsequent to the execution of said mortgage either as purchasers, incumbrances or otherwise be forever barred and foreclosed of all right, title, claim or equity of redemption in and to said real property and every part thereof, and that said defendants, and each of them, be adjudged to pay any deficiency which may remain unpaid after applying the proceeds of said sale properly applicable to the satisfaction of said judgment, and for such other and further relief as to the court may seem meet with equity.

## Pointed Political Gossip.

After posing as a martyr and hero "at his post of duty," Chamberlain deserted his "post" and rushed back to Oregon to look after his campaign in person, because of the Republican tidal wave which will sweep Booth into the United States Senate.

Dull times, scarcity of work and low wages are eloquent arguments to the average voter that it is time to vote the Republican ticket straight. This election they are not enthusing over "non-partisanship."

Who is the best friend of the state, Chamberlain, who has been a continuous office holder and who has collected more than \$100,000 in salary, or Booth, whose business has brought more than \$10,000,000 into Oregon and given employment to many thousands.

Having made repeated promises if elected in 1908, he would give his undivided attention to seeing that Oregon received its share of the Reclamation fund, Chamberlain has failed to see that justice was accorded. Oregon, of the western states, is the only one which has contributed more and received less from this fund. Oregon has contributed more than \$10,000,000 and while it received an allotment of about \$4,000,000, even this sum has not been given.

Daily the decision grows that this is a Republican year and that the way to help bring back good times is to vote for Booth, for Senator Booth is a plain business man and not a politician, but having been successful in business it stands to reason that he knows how to get what Oregon needs at Washington.

The Public Lands Committee chairmanship was turned down by Chamberlain for the Military Affairs Committee, but Oregon is vitally interested in public lands.

Dissatisfaction with conditions existing under Democratic administration is solidifying the Republican vote in Oregon. This has been especially marked in the past few weeks, and is responsible for the renewed activity taken in the political campaign.

There are more unemployed; wages are being cut; jobs are scarce and necessities harder to get. This is a condition which has brought home to the voters and they are seeking a reason. Under Republican presidents the country has been prosperous, with plenty of work and good wages. The reverse is true under Democratic administrations. What causes these things is a matter of dispute, but the fact remains that a Republican administration means good times.

It is because the people have been thinking of these matters that they are considering the election seriously as it affects their own bread and butter. President Wilson has, at solicitation, written a letter saying that a Democratic majority in the Senate is needed if present policies are to be continued. Those who are tired of present conditions and want a return of prosperity will seek to give the Republican party a majority in the Senate by supporting R. A. Booth for Senator.

There is alarm in the Chamberlain camp because Hanley is cutting into the "wet" vote on which Chamberlain depended. Hanley says in his platform that he is against prohibition and this is bringing to him a large share of the "wet" vote. In Portland Hanley is receiving the backing of the saloonkeepers because he has openly announced that he is against the "drys". Heretofore Chamberlain has managed to line up the liquor vote without difficulty and at the same time, have enthusiastic "drys" working for him.

Assuring the public that he is a firm supporter of the Bryan peace policy, Chamberlain at the same time angles before the Oregon National Guard a militia bill which, if enacted, would place the state militia on a footing with the regular soldiers; would give the United States a militia like European countries now at war. It is the usual Chamberlain game of "playing both ends" and seeking support from all sides.

In a circular letter to members of the G. A. R., issued by Chamberlain's campaign manager the veterans are informed that he is doing all he can to keep the United States from being involved in war. Much stress is laid on his claim that he is supporting the Bryan peace policies. That is a bid for one end.

As Chairman of the Senate Committee on Military Affairs, members of the National Guard of Oregon have been assured that they have a friend in Chamberlain and that he is working to bring about the militia bill. This bill practically makes the

militia a standing army, for as contemplated the officers would draw pay all the year round, and it provides pay for the enlisted men. This military bill is the only means that in any directly benefits Oregon; the only bill to be considered by the committee of which Chamberlain is chairman. The value of making a standing army of the militia is open to debate, for farmers do not recognize any necessity for such a plan, and organized labor has always been opposed to the militia.

When Chamberlain had to make a choice of being chairman of the Public Lands Committee and the Committee on Military Affairs, he selected the latter, notwithstanding that Oregon citizen have a great deal of business with the Public Lands Committee. The Committee where the chairmanship would benefit the state, Chamberlain declined. The chief advantage of being chairman of the Military Affairs Committee is social opportunity.

## The South Africa Cloud.

No doubt the full gravity of the threatening situation in South Africa is appreciated in London. The proclamation of martial law throughout the entire colony by Premier Botha has not been a step, we take it, unauthorized by the British ministry. And it would not have been authorized for other than the gravest reasons. In fact, the proclamation in itself makes little effort to conceal the extent of the danger. The open desertion of the British for the Germans by Col. Maritz and his men, after negotiations with the German governor of the Southwest African possessions of the kaiser, could easily enough be taken as shaming conditions not at all satisfying as to the loyalty of the Boers to the British cause.

The measures being taken are well advised, but it is much to be doubted whether they can prevent an uprising which will divert considerable of British military strength to deal with it. To defeat the Boers in 1898 Great Britain was compelled, first and last to organize and equip an army of more than 200,000 men. Being in possession of all the railways and telegraphs, and in governmental control of all the different provinces as well as the central government at Cape Town, might make the task easier now. Still, against such hardy and warlike men as the Boers have often shown themselves to be, it can be readily seen that an army of men such as Great Britain can ill afford to spare at this time would have to be taken from fields of more important and vital action and sent to South Africa, should the revolt spread as fast and as far as it is evidently feared that it will.

In such an emergency it is impossible that the government in London might conclude to let the country go, at least for a time. A part of the revelations brought out by the testimony of Col. Maritz is that the Germans have promised the Boers an independent government. The situation reveals, in a flash, that the Boers so far from accepting a foreign rule and acquiescing in it from choice, as often reported, are still as ardently desirous of liberty as they were when an army of a quarter of a million men was needed to subdue them. There may be a Nemesis in all of this for that British policy which, for a number of years, reflected the commercial spirit of exploitation embodied in such men as Cecil Rhodes and Dr. Jameson, England would, should the revolt grow to such proportions as would show that the Boers still desire freedom, win the admiration and moral support of the world, and strengthen herself for bigger work, by letting them have it without a struggle.
