Editorial Says This.

We thought Frank Taylor would court himself in as justice of the peace, but we hope this is not contempt of court, Frank, on our part.

Only three of the amendments carried out of 29. That looks as though the citizens are not much enthused over our dual system of legislation.

The mugwamp editor at Nehalem seems to have had a fit of the jim jams. Did the prohibition measure put your liver out of whack, Bro. Cotton.

It is to be hoped that the state legislature will pass stringent penalties for violating the prohibition law. It can't make the penalty any too severe as far as we are concerned for we do not want to see a repetition of the bootlegging that prevailed in this county under local option.

Wouldn't that jar you. It used to cost about \$300 a year to audit the county books, but now the Tax Commission does the auditing its cost has doubled. It is items like this which make taxes come high. But it takes money to run the numerous commissions. The Tax Commission charge for auditing the county books is \$676.60 or nine months. We hope Governor elect Withycombe will "swat" some of these commissions.

We have frequently referred to the exorbitant rates charged for water in this city, but the citizens, although they complain about high taxation, allow this to go on and submit to the heavy toll. The citizens are paying three times more for water than in some cities, and is not surprising that they are complaining. And there is another thing in connection with this matter. Some of our citizens cannot see the wisdom of taxing the citizens with exorbitant water rates and then loaning the surplus money out at interest. Last year two mills was levied by the water commission and this brought in a revenue of nearly \$1400.00. This has been going on ever since the system was installed, and amounts to somewhere near \$12,000 the property owners have paid in taxation besides the high water rates.

The snap shot man is opposed to the recall law on general principles. Our contention is that every office holder is entitled to a fair trial before an impartial judge or jury before he is removed from office. It is an easy matter to circulate misleading and untruthful statements about office holders by irresponsible or biased persons or by persons who, for some reasons, have a grudge or are grouchy with office holders. We are not going into the merits of the recall petition now being circulated to recall District Attorney M. J. Gersoni, but this is a case where we think that those who bring charges against him should go into court and testify on oath and he should be given an opportunity to give his side of the case. That we contend, is fair play for both sides, but to resort to a recall before this is done, in our judgment, is wrong. Another thing that should not be overlooked. If, as is alleged, the district attorney is incompetent, then the taxpayers of Tillamook County are asked to expend about \$1200 on a recall election to remedy the mistake of the Governor in appointing him, without giving him a fair trial. We believe that recallers should put up the money for a recall election and not the taxpayers.

We want to make a few suggestions in regard to the budget for next year's county expenses, to avoid the misunderstanding and bickering that took place when the last annual budget was discussed. We think we can

say this without fear of contradiction, that no one wants to pay more taxes than they have to, but in discussing the levy for next year, the first matter to consider is the county's needs, the most important of which is road improvements, and the amount of money necessary to carry on this work. We are of the opinion that \$125,000 to \$140,000 could be used to good advantage next year in road work, giving the road districts in the north and south parts of the county \$40,000 each and \$50,000 for the central district. But what we want to suggest is this: That Commissioners elect McKimms and Owens name advisory boards of five or more in their respective districts, and that Judge Mason do the same, and go over the necessary improvements in each district. No doubt a great many improvements will be recommended, but the county commissioners and judge, with the aid of these advisory boards in each district could arrive at a better understanding, and recommend what work should be undertaken and what should be continued for another year. We believe this would enable all parts of the county wanting road improvements to be heard and receive a square deal, and would avoid one district butting in and knocking road work in other districts, which is not right. It is impossible for any County Court to please everybody in planning for next year's road work, for the reason it will not have the money to do all the work demanded, but the citizens in each district will be better pleased if they know that an advisory committee in each district helped to plan out and decide how and where the road money should be expended. Take the snap shot man's advice and see how it works out this year anyway.

Since writing the above, we find that the county court has appointed an advisory board, but we still think our idea is the best in having an advisory board for each of the three road districts. The court appears to take a gloomy view of the financial and business situation, but this should not put a stop to the progress and development of this county. It is just as well to state right here that the overhead charges have to be met, such as used salaries, state moneys, schools, county poor, justice, etc. and the only place where any material reduction in taxes can take place is in curtailment of road and bridge improvement and we are inclined to think that the people of the county are in favor of this work progressing as rapidly as possible. But, as we have previously stated, the first consideration in adjusting the budget for next year is the needs of Tillamook County.

Victory in Defeat.

The long drawn out senatorial race in Oregon is at last over, and while the returns are not all in it is evident that Geo. E. Chamberlain has won. His lead is so great that it will not be overcome, and for the next six years he will continue to represent Oregon in the nation's highest lawmaking body.

But while he has won it cannot be said that he has been successful. His victory was accomplished by besmirching his opponent's good name. He will go back to Washington, but not with clean hands. He will lack the satisfying consciousness that he has made a good fight. He will be denied the satisfaction of winning because of a just cause. For the campaign that has been waged for Senator Chamberlain has been the most maliciously slanderous in the recent history of Oregon.

Mr. Booth has been defeated, but he will remain at home with the knowledge that his hands are clean. He has thrown no mud. He has made no slanderous insinuations. He promised the people at the beginning of his campaign that he would do nothing to render less effective the man who was chosen to represent them in the senate and he has kept his promise to the letter—as is his habit. He can look every man squarely in the eye knowing that he has done nothing to be ashamed of. He has received less votes than his opponent, but he has been victorious in the sense that he has refused to go down in the gutter, even though he was sorely tempted. The campaign waged for Mr. Booth was clean and he lost. The campaign waged for Mr. Chamberlain was not clean and he won. But the memory of the mud that was thrown will linger for a long time, and it is to be hoped that it will become so distasteful as to discourage other men from seeking to gain office by libeling their opponents.

TEACHER'S ANNUAL INSTITUTE.

Enjoyable Gathering and Large Attendance.

The county institute for teachers, which was held in this city for three days of this week, was a success in every respect and a very profitable one from the viewpoint of the teachers. The Educational Institutions of the State contributed liberally toward the instructive part of the institute. The Monmouth Normal School was represented by M. S. Pittman, Mr. Pittman made a strong and favorable impression upon the teachers, and we hope to have him with us again. The University was represented by Dr. H. D. Sheldon. He not only gave us many instructive talks at the general sessions, but he also did valuable work for the high school teachers of the County, at round-table discussions. The Agricultural College was represented by Miss Helen Cowgill, and Prof. Frank Shepherd. They gave valuable instructions on Industrial Education, Manual Training, Domestic Science, Domestic Art, etc. Miss Cowgill gave some demonstration work, showing how to provide hot lunches etc. Prof. Shepherd gave an illustrated lecture on manual training, which was much appreciated. In addition to the above workers, Miss Ida Mae Smith, Rural Supervisor, for Yamhill County, gave very definite instructions to the teachers on the subjects of reading and numbers for the primary grades. Miss Smith has tried out many of the devices she introduces and is ready to show how to do the work. The new teachers should know after these lessons how to start a class in reading or numbers.

Mrs. Chas H. Jones, representing the Oregon Teachers Monthly, and the teachers had an opportunity to secure school reading in clubbing lists at rates that none should deprive themselves of this opportunity for improvement.

The teachers of the Tillamook School entertained the visiting or rural teachers Monday evening, as did also the Parent Teachers Association on Tuesday evening. These were both enjoyable times. The teachers became acquainted with one another. Luncheon was served. The orchestra provided the musical part of the program. Many answered to their names called either by appropriate remarks or with readings or recitations.

There were eighty-six teachers registered. Seventy-two are now working in the schools of the county. The teachers gained in many ways through the attendance at this institute. The valuable instruction that was given along the difficulties that the teachers meet with would probably be estimated as the greatest gain. The enthusiasm by hearing the problems and efforts of other teachers is a valuable asset for the schools. The opportunity for organizing in every way for united work, and for local and community work, is not to be overlooked. The question of doing away with the county institute and substituting in its place a summer school, was after much discussion, rejected, thus proving that the teachers sincerely believe, that the time and means consumed at the county institute is well spent. As the law provides for but one, they decided to continue the institute, preferable to having three weeks summer school. Therefore unless there should be a change in sentiment the teachers of Tillamook County will meet again next year in a body institute.
