

**COUNTY COURT INVITES ADVISORY BOARD.**

**To discuss the Budget for next Year's County Expenses.**

At a meeting of the County Court, it was decided to ask the assistance of an advisory board, in preparing the budget for next year's expenses when the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, on account of the European war, business is badly unsettled, and there is a general depression in business throughout the United States, and it is uncertain how long this may continue, and whereas,

Because of this depression, saw mills have been compelled to shut down, farm products have been lowered in price, and business houses have been compelled to lay off some of their employees, and to retrench in their expenses, and whereas,

Because of the above situation high taxes would be unusually burdensome at this time, the County Court has determined to reduce taxes to the lowest amount consistent with the proper administration of County affairs; to enforce the most rigid economy in every branch of the county government, and to postpone all unnecessary new work until better times, and whereas, in carrying out this policy the County Court desires the help and advice of representative taxpayers and men experienced in business and county affairs to assist the Court in determining how far reductions of County expenditures may be made without impairing the efficiency of any branch of the county government

Now, therefore, be it resolved, that W. H. Christensen, of Oretown; Frank Owens, of Cloverdale; F. R. Beals, of Tillamook; Wm. Maxwell, of Fairview; Robert Watt, of Bay City; G. R. McKimms, Mohler; and Ben Kuppenbender, Nehalem; be and they are selected as an advisory committee to meet with the County Court to consider the county budget for 1915, and make such suggestions and recommendations as they may deem fit and proper concerning the same, and also to suggest the amount which in their opinion should be raised by taxation for all County purposes, for the year 1915, to meet at the County Court room in Tillamook City on Thursday Nov. 10th, 1914, at one o'clock p.m., when it will organize by electing a chairman and secretary. The members of the committee will work with the County Court in preparing the budget, and will have before them complete facts and figures as to expenditures of the current year, as prepared in detail for their information by the County Clerk.

**Board Defers Building Gymnasium.**

To the voters of School Dist. No. 9:

We wish to make the following statement regarding building of a gymnasium.

This movement originated last winter with the Parent-Teachers Association.

We are informed that the original idea was to construct a play room for the small children of the school. Later, at a meeting of the above association, at which there was a very large attendance, a resolution was adopted asking the school board to take immediate action with the object of building a large gymnasium, it being thought that the play room and gymnasium could be built together at a considerable saving. This resolution was presented to the board, probably about the last of March, duly considered, and action deferred until the date of the annual school meeting in June. At the annual meeting, at which there was a large attendance of voters the matter was fully discussed and it was estimated that such a building as was desired would probably cost \$4000.00.

On motion a committee was appointed, consisting of Carl Haberlach, A. G. Beals and F. J. Stranahan, to investigate and report to the board their estimate on the amount to be expended on such a building, the board being directed that on the filing of such report to call a special meeting to provide funds for such a building. During the summer the committee filed the report recommending an expenditure of a sum not in excess of \$2000.00.

In pursuance of the instructions at the annual meeting the board called a special meeting of the voters to consider plans and provide funds for the building. This meeting was not largely attended, but those present were quite favorable to the construction of a gymnasium, and after considering several preliminary sketches which were submitted, we were directed to have plans prepared along the lines suggested by the voters and \$3000.00 was voted to pay for the erection of the building.

Some doubt was expressed as to \$3000.00 covering the cost, and to meet this situation the meeting directed us to call for bids for the building,

and in case no bid was submitted for \$4000.00 or less, to call another special meeting to vote more funds.

The plans and specifications were obtained and bids called for, the lowest of which was considerable in excess of \$4000.00.

The lowest bid submitted is higher than we have been authorized to expend, and we are letting the matter rest there until we are further instructed by the voters.

In the whole matter we have endeavored to carry out the wishes of the voters and that continues to be our desire. Should the voters desire to vote on the proposition again and file with us a petition to that effect, we will call another special meeting to consider the matter at any time.

Owing to the lateness of the season and general conditions we have concluded that it is inadvisable to proceed with the erection of the building and so recommend.

The report having been circulated that we have contracted for the erection of this building is a mistake.

The discussion will no doubt be very interesting. There will also be other numbers on the program. The public is invited and admission is free. The speakers will benefit by the presence of a large crowd, by learning, to speak before the public.

The Parent Teachers Association will give a dime social next Friday night, November 13th in the high school auditorium. The grade pupils will furnish the entertainment. Several musical recitals will be given by some of the high school students. After the entertainment a jolly good get together time will be had and refreshments will be served. Everybody is cordially invited.

Friday night Nov. 7th the Senior basket ball team went to play Bay City's team, a large truck load of young people left Tillamook about 8 o'clock and landed in Bay City about an hour later. The roads were bad and progress was slow, but this only gave time to store up more energy in the Tillamook team. The result was a victory of the Seniors over Bay City. The rousing cheering yells given were unmistakable signs of true school spirit.

The school library has been changed from the customary place to the room which was used for typewriting last year, all the books have been enlisted by the D system, this makes the library very flexible and new additions can be made with little or no difficulty. All the libraries in large cities are arranged and managed by this system.

The T.H.S. umbrella stands are well filled with umbrellas, they say that this is a sure sign of rain. There has been slight evidence of rainy weather in the last few days and it appears that the umbrella stands are good this system.

**Tillamook Cow Testing Association.**

The Tillamook Testing Association was the first one of the kind to be organized in the state among those now doing business and is now half way through with its third years work. About ten of the present members have been in for the whole three years and they report that the benefits derived have far outnumbered those expected at the start.

Improvement has been brought about by culling, better feeding, and a more general interest in the business. There is now in the vicinity of 700 cows being tested.

This year a prize fund was made possible by donations from the Clough Drug Co., Tillamook Feed Co., and several individuals in the community and this has been offered in prizes for the best records in two classes as follows:

In the cow class \$100 is to be divided; \$50 to one making the best record \$35 to the second and \$15 to the third. The other class is for heifers with first calf and to receive \$50; \$25 to the

first, \$15 to the second and \$10 to the third.

The competition for these prizes has been kept right along as can be seen by the six months summary below. Many a horse has crept up from near the rear of the bunch after the distance is half covered and come under the wire a full neck in the lead. So we find that this cow race is only half finished. It would be entirely possible for any of these first ten or even twenty cows to win out by greater persistency than the others.

It is hoped that the report will arouse all the owners of these cattle to better feeding and a little better care of the stock. A little extra care and feed right now will make a great difference in the persistence of the milk flow. Now is the time you should supply the cow with the material to make her "second wind" so that she will be able to sprint a little on the home stretch.
