

WAR WAS FORETOLD BY MANY PROPHETS. Some of the Seers Hit the Year Exactly—One Dates Back Six Centuries.

An extraordinary number of prophecies have been made with regard to the great European war—prophecies old as well as new—prophecies which are already partly fulfilled.

"This year we shall pass through the gravest and most decisive hours. It will be a year especially happy for France, in spite of blood, in spite of tears, and in spite of uneasy omens.

Mme. de Thebes was curiously correct too, in her forecasts of Italian and Austrian events, for she foretold a new pope, and great changes with him, and of Austria, she said: "The drama in the imperial valley which I foretold is near to accomplishment.

An earlier dictum of hers appeared in her almanac of 1912. "Germany menaces Europe in general and France in particular. When the war breaks out, hers will be the responsibility, but after the war there will no longer be Hohenzollern or Prussian hegemony.

"Slavs Heavy With Fate."

Another Parisian prophetess, Mme. Sybilla, an interview with whom appeared in the Stampa of Turin last January, said:

"The sky of Europe could not be more turbid. On every side the outlook is of blood and war. The hands of the Slavs are heavy with fate. Indeed the hands of all politicians are steeped in fury and dissimulation.

The prophecy of a monk who lived in Saxony 600 years ago is already widely known: "There will be a king in Germany under whom the nation will be greater than ever before.

Another well known prophecy says that "the kingdom of a ruler who has six sons and who mounts his horse on the wrong side will be swept away.

An Indian Magi, in an almanac published last January, announced: In the month of July, 1914, all Europe will be overwhelmed by a war between the great powers, and terrible disasters will result.

A Japanese prophecy dates back as far as 1703. This ran: "When men fly like birds, ten great kings will go to war against each other; the universe will be under arms."

On the Continent two prophecies are well known. One is called the "prophecy of Strasburg." The other is that of a gypsy woman, which is said to have had a great influence with the Kaiser; so great, indeed, that in 1899 Herr von Jagow gave this as a reason why there should be no European war until after 1913.

The Mystic Numbers.

The Kaiser's grandfather went to this old seer, and asked her three questions. It was a time of changes and upheavals, and the first of these questions was when the German states, then just formed into the German Union, would become an empire.

The second question was: "How long am I to ride over this empire?" The women did as before, taking the year 1871.

These figures come to 1888. Amazed at her confidence, the prince again questioned her. "How long is this empire to last?" She worked as before, taking 1888 as the key.

The answer was 1913. Prince William became German emperor in 1871 and died in 1888.

The "prophecy of Strasburg" foretold the rise of the German empire in 1870 or 1871. As every one knows the date of its fall as a generation and a half from that date.

Kansas Women Urge Better Homes.

Making housekeeping a profession as such as stenography, the law, medicine and any other profession undertaken by women and the rearing of children with the same care that the farmer looks after his pigs and cattle, is a new plan of the Kansas clubwomen.

"The home ought to be put on a business basis," said Mrs. J. H. Ward of Hays City, chairman of the home Economics Department of the Kansas Federation of Women's Clubs.

Whatever is good for the home is good for the nation. Make housekeeping an inspiring profession by using brains in your housework. It is as important to use time-saving devices in the home as in the factory.

"It is the business of the home to develop children morally, mentally and physically. When the women of the state feed their children as carefully and scientifically as the men feed the farm animals, they will take a long step toward the betterment of the race.

"It is as poor an investment to indulge a child's appetite for things that are bad for the health as it is for the farmer to neglect his stock. Study the food values. Learn why it is that you should not feed your family rice, potatoes and bread and nothing else.

Through Mrs. Ward and her assistants in the department of the state has undertaken to prepare a course of professional training for housekeeping. For many years the state has spent thousands of dollars every year making experiments to develop the cheapest and best feeds of all kinds for livestock and only a few dollars has been spent in the last few years in experimenting with human foods.

For several years the Agricultural College has been sending lecturers throughout the state to teach the women how to cook and sew, but not until this fall did it develop a course of study of babies and children.

Sale of Shingle Bolt Timber.

The District Forester at Portland, Oregon, has just approved a sale of 2,267 cords of timber on the Snoqualmie National Forest, to the Moose Shingle Co., of Gold Basin, Wash.

The timber is situated on Wisconsin Creek, on the Monte Cristo branch of the Northern Pacific Railroad, and consists of 1,480 cords of western red cedar shingle bolt timber, 396 cords of western hemlock, and 391 cords of amabilis fir.

The stumpage price for the cedar is \$1.36 per cord, and for the other species 31 cents per cord. The agreement with the Forest Service allows the company until December 31, 1915, for the cutting and removal of the timber.

A Great Soldier Gone.

Earl Roberts was the greatest general of his time because he made the greatest use of the opportunities of a time not prolific in opportunities for military display, by English soldiers, on a scale commensurate with the highest military talents.
