Death of J. H. Johnson.

James Howard Johnson was born in Missouri, June 21, 1860, and died at Sheridan Oregon, on Dec. 4, 1914. Aged 53 years, 5 months and 13 days. He lived in his native state until 11 years ago, when he moved to Tillamook Oregon. After residing there 4 years he moved to Sheridan, where he made his home until his death. Besides a wife and four children, he leaves five brothers, and four sisters and a mother, with a number of other kindred to mourn his untimely departure. He was the third of a large family to leave this world, the father and an infant sister preceding him. Four years ago through overwork Mr. Johnson contracted an illness from which he never recovered, but during the entire time of his extreme suffering he was never known to murmur or complain. He united with the Christian church over 20 years ago and has lived a faithful and consistent life during all these years. He was true to the word of God and always abided by its teachings. A faithful father and husband, a loyal member of the church—has fallen. The members of the Modern Woodmen, an order that the deceased became a member of years ago, acted as pallbearers. The funeral was held from the Christian church Sunday afternoon, Rev. Z. O. Doward, the pastor, conducting the services. The body was laid to rest in the Masonic cemetery.—Sheridan Sun.

Died at the Pendleton hospital, Umatilla Co., Oregon, Dec. 12, 1914. Mrs. J. M. Harrison, age 37 years, 9 months and 24 days.
 Marguerita Eichinger was born in Leroy, Dodge County, Wisconsin, February, 18, 1877. At the age of three years she moved with her parents to Kansas and when 15 years of age moved with her parents to Tillamook Co., Oregon. On July 5, 1895 she was married to Joseph M. Harrison. To the union one child was born.
 They made their home in Tillamook until October, 1913, at the death of her husband. She was a devoted wife and mother. Was always ready to help the needy, kind and gentle, loved little children dearly, and lived for the beautiful in life. Although no public show was made of Christianity, she lived a pure christian life, dying as she lived, believing in the Almighty God and a home in the "Hereafter."

The vacancy she leaves in the lives of her family and friends can never be filled, but her memory will live forever.

The remains were brought to Tillamook where funeral services were held from the M. E. Church, Dec. 15. Rev. Gittins officiating. Interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY M. J. GERSONI WON'T RESIGN.

Fairview Grange Passes Resolution Requesting Him to do So.

On Thursday of last week at the regular meeting of the Fairview Grange, District Attorney Gersoni was asked to resign by a resolution passed by a unanimous vote of the Grange. The following signed statement was tendered Mr. Gersoni.

Fairview Grange, Dec. 10, 1914.
 A resolution to the effect that District Attorney Gersoni be requested to resign was passed by a unanimous vote of the Grange today. C. E. Trombley is requested to deliver the resolution to Mr. Gersoni. The Grange feels that Mr. Gersoni would be doing the county a service by resigning and ask him to meet this obligation.

Mr. Gersoni makes the following reply:

Tillamook, Dec. 10, 1914.
 To the Fairview Grange,
 Tillamook, Oregon.

Gentlemen,
 Mr. C. E. Trombley, editor of the Tillamook Herald, presented to me the resolution passed by your body to the effect that the Grange feels that I would be doing the county a service by resigning from my office as District Attorney of your county, and asking me to meet this request as my obligation.

In reply to your request, I desire to state, first, that I know of no reason why I should be requested by the Grange of this county or any other organized body or individual to resign from my office; secondly, the day before you gentlemen passed this resolution, I met the Master of the Grange Mr. J. H. Dunstan, and suggested to him that if you gentlemen of the Grange desired to take any action or express the opinion of the Grange concerning the question of my recall would be pleased to receive an invitation (by phone) to attend your gathering and explain the recall proposition and answer any and all questions which any member may desire to know concerning myself or my office as District Attorney of this county.

Mr. Dunstan remarked that the Grange had no other object than to see fair play and protect the interests of the county and its taxpayers; and he further intimated that matters of a political nature or otherwise have

no bearing or consideration in the Granges of this county.

It is evident from your action that you gentlemen did not wish to hear both sides of the question or to ascertain the true state of facts. If you did, you would have indulged at least in the courtesy of hearing as to what I may have to say concerning a question which affects the whole county and touches its finances.

I have not as yet been able to find out from the grand jury, who started this recall, or Governor West, the members of your grange or any one of the persons who signed the recall petitions, the real and true cause why you all demand that I shall resign my office or be recalled. I have been looking for an opportunity to meet face to face the charges and complaints against me, and until the present day I have been unable to find any one person in this County who would come forward and publicly state any fact or good reason why I should be recalled.

Your grange has taken a snap judgment, without knowing and hearing the other side of the question.

I feel that I do not owe you or the people of this county any obligation to resign from my office, unless I have violated my oath of office or that I am incompetent to hold my position.

Gentlemen, I am also proud to feel and believe that the day of condemning a man without a hearing is beyond the present day of civilized and liberal nation and above the spirit of the American people.

In view of this statement, I will not resign from my office as you request, but will stay upon my merit and let the people of this county decide on the election day whether or not I am fit and worthy to hold my office.
