One serious and well made criticism directed at

the initiative and referendum is the fact that it is worked too hard. Too much legislation is proposed and submitted to the people and the same is a situation that exists in the legislature. Often one thousand bills are introduced in one session, and it is a physical impossibility for a member, however industrious and well disposed to familiarize himself with all of the important matters connected with the deluge of ill prepared legislation. What the people should demand from all of the legislative function is less laws but more carefully drawn and more seriously considered. Locality be lost sight of and members should represent Oregon and not some special county or particular district.—Blue Mountain Eagle.
