The A. F. Coats Lumber Co. is making preparations to make several permanent improvements to the saw mill in this city. A contract was let to the North Coast Dry Kiln Co., of Seattle, for a concrete dry kiln, which will be 20 feet wide and 108 feet long and on the south side of the kiln a lumber shed will be built 144 feet long and 70 feet wide with a 20 by 144 feet loading platform for shipping lumber by rail. A new 66 inch by 16 inch boiler will be installed on the south side of the present boilers, and a bridge is to be built across the slough and a spur built to the lumber yard north of town.

BOOSTING THE FAIR.

J. H. Dunstan Makes Remarks at Fairview Literary Society.

Mr. J. H. Dunstan, who is one of the active members of the Tillamook Fair Board, made some appropriate remarks at a meeting of the Fairview Literary Society on Thursday, that should help boost the next Tillamook County Fair. He said:

"In 1915 we expect Fairview will have a paved road from the Grange Hall to Tillamook City, which will greatly stimulate our commercial and social activities.

"The program committee recognized my Hobby suggested that I state something along the line of the County Fair for 1915, in 1913 Fairview took first prize for the best Grange exhibit, in 1914 she took first for Grange exhibit and first for individual exhibit, and in 1915 she has the opportunity to take first for Grange, first for Farm, and first for best School exhibit, and I especially desire to urge upon you the importance of the school and industrial exhibits.

"According to the new rules governing the industrial contests, the county superintendent is the leader and the county agriculturist is the adviser, the leader and adviser cannot accomplish much without and intelligent co-operation of the people, both parents and children.

"Now it is the duty of these men to encourage and push forward this work and if they cannot, or do not show you how to make a good county fair, I would suggest you get busy and show them, Mr. Ed. Donaldson has shown what can be done by intelligent effort in growing of vegetables and fruits, forage plants and grasses, and I am sure he is willing to give you the benefit of his experience along these lines.

"We also expect the live stock men of Fairview to boost that department of the Fair in 1915, Mr. Chas Kunz, J. J. Rupp and others have recently purchased some high class registered Holsteins, Morrison Mills, Wm. Maxwell and others have increased their herds of registered Jerseys, we have a right to expect a showing of pure bred live stock, of which we may just be proud.

"The Fairview people have done pioneer work in getting the fair started, and I trust you will continue to give it your earnest support.

"Nehalem, Bay City, Beaver Cloverdale and Oretown will be in evidence at the 1915 Fair and it behooves Fairview to bear in mind that it will require earnest efforts to hold her place at the front.

"There are people in these communities who realize the necessity of making every acre of land produce to its fullest capacity and the importance of developing the production of our dairy cows to the highest possible point. Our County Fair is a means to this end.

"It would please me greatly to see these others Grangers and Schools come to the front and make as good a showing as Fairview and Tillamook not that I am not loyal to Fairview and Tillamook but I am just as loyal to every other community in the County as I am to Fairview.

"I am sure the other members of the Fair Board feel just as I do in this matter, and want it understood that the Fair is not run in the interest of any individual or set of individuals, that it is not managed in the interest of any one locality, but it is for the entire county, the only objects of the

Fair are the advertising and the up-building of all the industries of the county, as a whole, without fear or favor."

DISTRICT ATTORNEY RECALLED

Attorney T. H. Goynne to Fill the Position.

The recall election on Tuesday, as was generally supposed, proved disastrous to District Attorney M. J. Gersoni, who was recalled by a vote of two to one, and Attorney T. H. Goynne won out with a like majority over Gersoni. The other two candidates, Attorney Callahan and Farnell, who were both new men in the county cut some figure and obtained quite a number of complimentary votes. Attorney Gersoni's strength was made up largely of persons who are opposed to the recall law, there being a strong sentiment in the County against it.

The "drys" turned the election into a "wet" and "dry" fight, and some of the churches took an active part in the candidacy of Attorney Goynne. It was in the farming community that Mr. Gersoni was so overwhelmingly defeated and where Mr. Goynne obtained strength.

Attorney M. J. Gersoni wishes to express to the voters who stood by him in the recall election his hearty thanks. He says the election proves that all the people of the county do not believe the charges made against him.

It is more than probable that Attorney M. J. Gersoni will contest the election there being some difference of opinion between attorneys whether an official appointed can be recalled. Mr. Gersoni left Friday morning for Portland, but had not decided what course he would adopt before leaving.

The official count of the election will be made Saturday.
