County Judge Messick, of Baker County, will not pay any more widow's pensions for that county. He says "The payment of these pensions is entirely discretionary with the county judge. I do not favor them, and so will not pay them."

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Berns celebrated the 40th anniversary of their wedding on Thursday, and much to their surprise their relatives provided a sumptuous dinner. They were the recipients of many congratulations and some nice presents.

Rev. F. A. Jones, who came to this city last week to start an Episcopal Mission, sent a telegram of congratulation to the new Bishop of Oregon, who was consecrated at Chicago on Wednesday, also from the new mission in this city.

Dr. W. G. McGee will leave Friday morning for Zanesville, Ohio, on account of the serious sickness of his father, who is not expected to live more than a few days. He is 87 years of age. Dr. McGee expects to return in about three weeks.

The newly elected county officials took office this week, but there were only a few changes. Commissioners F. L. Owens and Geo. R. McKimms taking the place of F. L. Sappington and H. M. Farmer, and County Surveyor Shreve taking the place of U. G. Jackson.

At last Yamhill County has taken a stand for better roads, and the inclusion of a \$15,000 appropriation in the yearly budget for fixing up that notoriously bad stretch of bad road, known as the Grand Ronde road, means not alone much to those living along the stretch, but the Tillamook coast run will be, if it is not already, the most popular auto driveway in the state.—Sheridan Sun.

W. G. Dwight, president of the Tillamook Commercial Club, and others, appeared before the County Court on Wednesday, and made a plea in behalf of the large number of men who are out of work, and asked the court if it could not devise some plan whereby road work could be provided for them, it being stated that a large number of the unemployed, and their families, were dependent upon the store-keepers for their support.

Judge Holmes rendered a decision in the case of C. S. Atkinson vs. James Langley, giving the plaintiff \$170.00. In the case of Lewis L. Smith vs. W. G. Dwight, which was a tax certificate case, he judge held, by reason of the complaint not stating facts sufficient to constitute cause of action, the judgment was set aside. In the case of the Whitney Co. vs. Good Roads Machinery Co., defendants were allowed to recover \$37.50 costs in the case.

A watch night meeting was held at the home of Mr. Elmer Hall, on the evening of Dec. 31st. As it was prayer meeting night, a short service

was held. Then the games were started, and young and old made merry until the wee small hours of the morning. Light refreshments were served at midnight, music was furnished by and Edison phonograph. After wishing the host and hostess all the joys of the New Year, the guests departed, thinking the watch night party a perfect success. There were thirty one present.

A fire alarm was turned in about half past eleven o'clock on Tuesday night. While L. E. Dick was on his way home he heard cries of distress, and going to the city hall he found that the jail was on fire, and a man by the name of Walters was locked up in the burning building. The man had been placed there by Marshal Myers on a charge of drunkenness, and while in that condition he set the bed clothing on fire. The man was nearly choked with smoke when the marshal arrived on the scene and unlocked the door.

On Thursday of last week, Benjamin Emerson a brakeman on the P. R. & N., was fatally injured while standing watching the track being cleared of a slide at Mayo. It seems that a rock became dislodged and came rolling down the hill and struck Emerson on the head. He was rendered insensible and was immediately placed on a train going to Portland and taken to the hospital. He

died, however, about an hour after arriving there. The rock which caused Emerson's death weighed only two pounds, but it fractured his skull.

The unfortunate man, who was a brakeman on one of the freight trains stalled by the slide, was buried in Portland.
