Plaintiff had a written agreement with defendant that if he sent a party to him who bought the place for \$17,000, consisting of 40 acres, two miles S.E. of Tillamook he was to receive \$500. Having done so and the place being sold to Frank Paul, plaintiff now sues for his commission. *

Timbermen Raise Objections.

Some of the timber interests have raised an objection to the action of the County Court in rearranging the expenditure of the road fund to provide for two miles instead of half a mile on the Bayocean road to be constructed this year. There is some difference of opinion with attorneys in regard to this, and, at first when District Attorney Goynes was appealed to for advice, he gave it as his opinion that the County Court could not do this, but since then he is inclined to think differently. Mr. Goynes has asked the Attorney General for an opinion, and if he decides in favor of the timbermen, then it is going to act as a boomerang to them, for as soon as it is known that each road district can obtain more money for their respective districts, the next budget meeting will be packed with citizens who will vote for the limit, to mill. We do not believe that this is the right and proper procedure, and hope it will not prevail. The timbermen contend that the Bayocean item of \$3,000 can only be raised 10 per cent but the former court construed the law as applying to the road fund which can be raised 10 per cent, a the items for different roads improvements were not included in the budget published by the court. It was at the request of the editor of the Headlight that the different items for road work were published for the information of the citizens. Last year when the budget was discussed there was a certain sum for road and bridge work, and notwithstanding no provision had been made to construct part of the Bayocean road, the Court appropriated \$2,000. It is safe to say that what money is levied for road work will be expended, if not on the Bayocean road then somewhere else, and there will be that much more to provide for next year, for the people of the county see the injustice of depriving Bayocean of a way out. Should the county Court be limited to \$3,000 for that road, a movement will be started and petitions circulated for a special election to empower the County Court to construct the road and issue warrants to pay for it out of the money appropriated for road district No. 2, the next two years. *

The State Legislature Convened on Tuesday.

For the first time in 12 years, barring the two years which Frank Benson was Acting-Governor, Oregon tonight has a Republican in the executive chair. Says the Oregonian. *

Incidentally Dr. James Withycombe has realized the ambition for half a lifetime. *

The situation presents a promising outlook for the welfare of the state. If party government and party responsibility are the strong influences for efficiency in government that economists represent them to be there will be less friction between the Executive and state officers, less combativeness exhibited between Governor and Legislature and more accomplished in the succeeding four years in constructive administration and legislation than in the entire period during which so much sparring for political advantage and personal aggrandizement was exhibited. *

The Governor's message left a distinctly pleasant impression with the members of the Legislature, the state officers, the visiting city and business representatives, and the throng of citizens in the lobby. The part generally accepted as the keynote of the address and of his administrative policy was the plan offered for centralizing state departments and such other advice as may be classified within an economy program. *

In this respect Governor Withycombe is not a radical when measured with some of the members of the House and Senate. He did not suggest so many changes as are mentioned in the resolution presented in the Senate by Senator Barrett, and which has the backing of numerous leaders in the upper house. Even this resolution does not cut so deep into the tangled mat of boards and commissions as some profess a willingness to sink the knife. *

The impression left at the close of the second day, when practically all sides, except office holders, have been heard from tentatively or officially, is that the Legislature will not endeavor to see how little it can do and keep faith with the people, but how much it can accomplish without going to extremes. *

First batch of bills introduced were these:

- Providing means of enforcing prohibition amendment enacted by people at last election.
- Repealing all standing and continuous appropriations.
- Enabling cities to construct and maintain joint waterworks systems.
- Requiring lobbyists to register and limiting their activities.
- Abolishing State Immigration Commission.
- Abolishing State Accountancy Board.
- Imposing gross revenue tax upon express, telephone and telegraph Cos.
- Abolishing private employment agencies.
- Authorizing school boards to call special elections to consider free textbooks.
- Providing new method of imposing licenses for fishermen.
- Imposing gross revenue tax upon sleeping-car, refrigerator car and oil companies.
- Making food for domestic animals an item of "family expense."
- Providing bounty on seals.
- Restoring sheriffs of counties as tax collectors.
- Making it possible to send boys between 16 and 18 to State Reformatory.
- Amending game laws, limiting deer season to September and October and permitting killing of female pheasants.
- Providing permanent registration of electors.
- Fixing method whereby electors may become candidates for office without circulating petitions and requiring candidates to pay fee upon filing.
- Making possible for women to serve on juries.
- Requiring registration of lobbyists.
- Making women eligible to serve on grand juries.
- Making possible for cities and towns to surrender charters and merge with other cities.
- Providing permanent registration of voters.
- Abolishing county educational boards.
- Providing for registration and licensing of teachers, creating boards of examiners for music teachers and placing such teachers under direction of State Superintendent of Public Instruction.
