NEWSPAPERS ARE THEME OF SERMON.

Dr. Frank L. Loveland Pleads for "White" Journalism and Educational Columns.

Appealing to the editor as an ordained minister of righteousness and civil liberty to join hands with the preacher, doctor, politician and teacher in upholding the standards of intelligence and morality, Dr. Frank L. Loveland, pastor of the First Methodist Church, last night pleaded that the newspapers should be "white" not "yellow," reliable not deceptive, clean not dirty, and educational and not deplorable.

Public Opinion Potent.

"An editor who knows nothing but his own paper becomes an exploded force, just as does the doctor who insists that he mustn't know anything outside of his insides," said Dr. Loveland. "As the lawyer steps into court with his brief he must not conduct himself as a mere pettifogger and ambulance-chaser, but for the spokesman for the welfare of mankind."

Portland Papers Praised.

"Between 8,000,000 and 10,000,000 copies of daily papers are distributed annually, or 100 copies for every person in the United States. This illustrates the tremendous power the press has through its circulation. Less than one-fourth of our people go to church and less than one-fourth ever graduate from a grammar school. Consequently three-fourths of the people receive their teaching, their moral culture and do their thinking through the newspapers. We should feel thankful that the yellow journals which hunt the sewers and swirl barrels of human life are becoming fewer and fewer in this country, as statistics show clearly."

Who Knows of a Crippled Child?

County Superintendent Buel has received an appeal from the Oregon State Federation of Women's Clubs, asking him to tell their hospital committee about any crippled children in this county who could be aided by a state-wide organization to furnish free medical treatment of the most modern scientific kind in all cases where the family income is not sufficient for expensive consultation with specialists.

The Federation, which includes a hundred women's clubs in all parts of the state, asks anyone who knows of a little victim of an accident, of spinal meningitis, of infantile paralysis, or of tuberculosis in the bones or joints, or any other crippling cause, to write the detail of the case to Mrs. Millie R. Trumbull, Secretary Child Welfare commission, 250 1/2 Third St., Portland Oregon.
