These papers embrace all that's best in American current news, pictures and literature, "Cartoons" copies all the best pictures and cartoons from all nations now at war, and is a whole world of pictures in itself.

Comfortable chairs are ready, it is insisted that members and their families and visitors in our city, should make use of this reading room.

There will be a "smoker" of all club members on Monday evening Jan. 25. The committee on Port enlargement will report and arrangements perfected to vote on this important matter, and it will be pushed to a success.

The matter of taking in the entire county band as honorary members of the club, will be taken up at the band's request and turning over all club dances and entertainments to the band, the club and band each taking one half of the profits.

The matter of free sites for factories will be discussed, as two plants are ready to come with their pay rolls if free sites are given them. A committee of Messrs Leach, Miller and Dr. Olson are investigating and will report.

The trustees are arranging for a lot of new advertising embracing our county's leading industries, cheese, trees and beach resorts, lands, etc and plans are being laid to get such information before the people from other states that will come west to the world's fair in California this year. Secretary Worrall is devoting his entire time without pay, to the business matters, and the officers and directors are giving freely their time, and from now on more time will be devoted to business and advertising and less to social amusements.

The directors feel that the club should have support from many of our citizens that do not contribute to the support of the club by joining and urgently insist that many should join the club and help push and not stay out of the club and help pay expenses, but reap the benefit of the club's work, it costs \$125 a month to pay current club expenses and no salaries are paid to no one.

The directors have ordered that only club members shall hereafter be invited to club dances and "Smokers" on the theory that those who pay to keep up the club shall alone enjoy its privileges, and that the club is not run for a free-for-all to furnish amusements to those who won't help support it, they have also ordered that the club rooms shall not be rented to nor used by any but club members, of course strangers and visitors are always welcome and those from country towns and all farmers. The club will throw its doors open to all such and entertain all conventions that come to our city, they feel that the club's hospitality has been imposed upon by many citizens who though able to do so, refuse to help support the club, club members who dance always pay the same as outsiders who come to dances, as well as pay \$1.50 a month dues to keep up the club, as no dances or entertainments are paid for out of the club's treasury, so if you want to enjoy the club's social functions you will have to join the club, the house rules will be strictly enforced, club members, their ladies and children under 18 years of age, can come. Only such other ladies as are invited by club's entertainment committee, no male residents of city except members and their sons under 18 years, can come; club members can bring visitors and strangers and can procure card for such from the secretary. Citizens not members can neither come nor send nor bring visitors. See the secretary for further information; come on now and join the club and help boost our city and county and don't be a "hang-on" or drone but do your share.

On motion of Pres. Dwight a vote of thanks and appreciation was ordered by the directors of the commercial club to Sec. Worrall for the grand success of the Holiday Festivities, and the high moral plane on which they were conducted, free from objectional characters and deers.
