The largest logging engine ever shipped to this county is now being unloaded in this city for the new logging company, also one of the latest styles of boilers for logging engines. These will be taken to Bewley Creek, where the logging camp is situated.

Ex-County Surveyor U. G. Jackson has taken an interest in the movement to develop the lime industry south of this city, there being a large amount of clay in sight available to burn into lime, which is something this county needs. Machinery will be installed to handle the clay.

Mrs. Wm. G. Tait received sad news the first of the week that her mother, Mrs. Sawyer, had died suddenly at Evanston, Ill., and she immediately left for that place. Mr. and Mrs. Sawyer visited this city about two years ago, and was here when the railroad was tied up.

A few of the progressive women of the city have organized a class in physical culture. The very rainy winter days make it almost impossible to take outdoor exercise, and an indoor life is not conducive to health unless some systematic effort at physical culture is carried out.

Collier & Stephenson, of Salem, have been awarded the contract to dyke H. F. Goodspeed's tide land at the mouth of the Wilson River. The contractors will bring in a dyking machine as soon as possible. The contract amounts to 12 cents a yard, and the work is to be completed by the 1st of August.

Mr. Hoskins state room was flooded and everything he had with him was soaked.

McGhee died at that place, last week, where his son had gone on account of the serious illness of his father, who was 86 years of age and a Civil War veteran. Dr. McGhee when he left here did not expect to reach home before his father died.

It is thought probable that he matter will be compromised to avoid expensive litigation.
