As there appeared to be about the same amount of evidence that the defendant did and did not strike Kellow, the jury brought in a verdict for the defendant. It seems that the jury objected to that kind of a case being brought into court, causing expense to the taxpayers.

Red Clover Creamery.

At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Red Clover Creamery, January 19th, the stockholders expressed their satisfaction of the industry in which the business of the factory was conducted during the past year, by reelecting the former Board of Directors and voting to remain independent for the present.

All of his factories output for 1914 has been old and the patrons paid for the December milk. The total amount of cheese manufactured was 280,687 pounds, the patrons receiving \$1,520,000 for the same. Average yield 100 pounds of milk. Average yearly test 4.09; the yield was 11.10 pounds cheese to each 100 pounds of milk delivered.

Owing to all the 1914 output being old and reported, these averages are based on actual figures for the year, while in former years, the month of December and frequently November were estimated.
