Klamath Enjoined From Paying Cash

A preliminary injunction against the County Court and officials of Klamath County stopping them from paying out \$455,000 on old warrants was granted by Federal Judge Wilverton in the suit of three of the heaviest non-resident taxpayers of the county, who accused the officers of gross extravagance with public funds.

Klamath County is enjoined from paying the old debts until a final decision is made in the case. The suit was brought by the Weyerhaeuser Land Company, the Western Pacific Land & Timber Company, and the Oshkosh Land & Timber Company, which own nearly 17 per cent of the total assessed property valuation of the county.

Alleging a violation of the constitutional provision which prohibits any county from incurring indebtedness in excess of \$5,000, the complaint charges that the officials made so many expenditures during the period of two years that the county was set back seven years in the payment of its warrants.

During 1911, 1912 and part of 1913 it is alleged that Klamath County incurred a voluntary indebtedness of \$371,000. The warrants drawing interest at the rate of 6 per cent, increased this amount to \$455,000. Besides this, there is said to be an indebtedness of \$120,000 for involuntary expenditures, such as salaries and regular maintenance. To this amount the three tax-paying companies offered no protest.

A large part of the voluntary indebtedness was incurred in the construction of a new court house, which is not yet completed. Affairs of the county reached such a state, it is declared, that warrants were discounted at 75 per cent of the face value. Unable to do business through their own warrants, it is charged that the county court discounted some of them, deposited the proceeds in a bank and issued check books to their road supervisors to pay labor bills.
