Plaintiff also asks for the custody and care of Floyd Wilson, and that she have and recover of the personal property the sum of \$410.00 and one-third part of the share of real property.

Frank Long, sr., administrator of the estate of William Campbell, plaintiff and respondent, vs. Pacific Railway & Navigation Co., defendant and appellant, appealed from Tillamook county to the supreme court, on rehearing, original opinion sustained. This was a case where Campbell was killed on the railroad at Wheeler and the jury assessed the damages at two thousand dollars. The supreme court held that Campbell was a contributing cause to the accident and reversed the decision of the lower court, and upon plaintiff asking for a rehearing, the supreme court sustained its previous decision in the case.

DOLPH ROAD IMPROVEMENT.

Court Takes Immediate Action to Have Road Surveyed.

The County Court on Wednesday devoted considerable time to the matter of the survey of the Dolph county road, to connect with a road that is surveyed in Polk county, which cuts out the toll road and Dolph and what have always been an eye sore to Tillamook County, what is known as the Grand Ronde reservation road. Yamhill and Polk counties are greatly interested in this improvement, for it gives those counties a good road to the coast, and it will eventually become part of the great State Highway. It will be also a great benefit to them. The project will cost between \$80,000 and \$100,000. Tillamook, Yamhill and Polk Counties will appropriate each, \$15,000 and the state \$45,000 and the Portland Automobile Club will contribute something towards it, it is said about \$10,000. Two delegations attended the meeting of the court, one favoring the Bear Camp route and the other the Sour Grass Creek route. J. J. Read representing the Portland Automobile club was present and advocated this improvement and promised financial aid. After considering the matter the court made this order:

This matter coming on to be heard as to the continuation of the survey of the Dolph county road, from Peterson place, by way of Baxter's to the Tillamook County line, to connect the Polk County survey, at Bear Camp, and the court being fully advised it was ordered that R. L. Shreve county surveyor, J. M. Baker and Forrest J. Ayer, be and they are hereby appointed as a board of county road viewers, to make a survey from the Peterson place, on the Dolph county road, by way of the Baxter place, the county line between Polk and Tillamook Counties, to connect with the survey made by the Polk county board of surveyors at Bear Creek; also to run a line by way of Baxter place up the Sour Grass creek, to connect with the present road, at or near what is known as the Bee ranch, said board of county viewers to meet at the Peterson place on the 14th of February, 1915.

So that no time should be lost in getting quick action, the court set the date for the board of viewers to meet today, and County Surveyor Shreve with his crew left this morning.

A Comparison.

To the Editor, Tillamook Headlight I notice in the last issue of the Headlight report covering Red Clover Creamery's work for the last year. Would you please publish extract from our report? This was the first year the South Prairie factory received more milk than Red Clover, putting South Prairie fourth place among the cheese factories in this county. Following are given for comparison Red Clover—Milk received, 2,527,162 lbs.; Cheese produced, 280,687 lbs. Average 100 pounds of milk, \$1.52. South Prairie—Milk received 2,527,709; Cheese produced, 283,855; Average 100 pounds of milk \$1.534.10. Thus you will note that while South Prairie received but 547 lbs. more milk, it produced over 3,100 lbs. more cheese.

To these that know conditions here it seems funny that these people should want to publish showing their good work, especially in the face of the fact that their bell weather, Lee, tried so hard last season to convince Tillamook people that cheese prices were altogether too high.

Lime in the soil will make possible far better crops on bottom lands.

Several thousand dollars being spent in this enterprise and we wish the promoters success. They have received numerous letters from people outside of Tillamook County as to the lime already, and it is probable that a shipping market will also be obtained.
