MILK PRODUCTION OF WESTERN EUROPE.

Its Cost As Compared With its Cost In America.

(By Hires Condensed Milk Co.)

Information supplied by the Department of Commerce relative to the cost of milk and farm and factory labor in Europe forms the basis of the following comparison:

Table with 2 columns: Country, Price per 100 lbs. (1914). Includes entries for England, Ireland, Holland, Switzerland, Germany, Denmark, Norway, and Sweden.

It can be readily seen that the difference in the cost of milk between the prices in Holland and Denmark (these two countries being the largest exporters to the United States) as compared with that in America...

Not only is the American milk condenser at a disadvantage in the matter of milk costs, but he is also forced to pay about one cent more a pound for the sugar that he uses...

All of these conditions tend to drive the American manufacturer of condensed milk to lower the standard of pay to the farmers producing milk...
